LOMSKI'S WARNING TO 'LAY OFF' EYE ROUSES M'CARTHY

'Frisco Fighter Declares Aberdeen Assassin Better Keep Pet Optic Under Cover if Can't Take It

Jack McCarthy's Irish temper was at boiling point today following alleged assertions by Leo Lomski that the latter would make short work of the San Francisco fighter in their match at the armory tonight if he attempted to work on Leo's blackened eye. McCarthy declared today it was the first time an opponent had attempted to tell him where he could or could not land blows and that he had been in the ring racket long enough not to be bluffed on any such basis.

"I'll land on Mr. Lomski whenever I see an opening to shoot one," said McCarthy, "and if he don't want his pet eye punched he better keep it under cover."

Interest in the winner-take-all event between Lomski and McCarthy, already high, has been given an added boost by the apparent animosity developed since both battlers reached the city.

Three other bouts, all carrying possibilities of considerable entertainment for the ring fans, will round out the card provided by Promoter Mack Lillard. Red Howe will trade haymakers with an experienced opponent, Roy Sullivan of Tacoma. In the six-round semi-windup, Herb White, Butte Falls, will meet Young Lutman, of Grants Pass, at the same distance, and Bob Christie, local heavyweight novice, will face Charlie Benton, Portland youngster, in a four-round curtain raiser.

The going will sound at 8:30 for the opening bout.

PETROLLE FAMILY POISON FOR 'BAT'

NEW YORK, July 20.—(AP)—It is unfortunate for Chris (Bat) Battalino that he neither can "take" the members of the Petrolle family nor leave them alone.

The former featherweight champion's ring career has suffered more than somewhat from the fact that he first thought he could lick Billy, the old Fargo Express, and then, falling in that, decided to take it out on the younger brother, Frankie.

Billy plattered Bat twice, almost ruining the Hartford Italian in each instance, and now Frankie has made it an even four triumphs for the tough Petrolle family over its most persistent rival.

Last night Frankie knocked Bat about for the second time in two weeks to gain a 10-round decision. He couldn't stop the Battler as Billy did in their memorable meetings during the winter, but he did the next best thing by knocking him flat in the fourth round for a nine count.

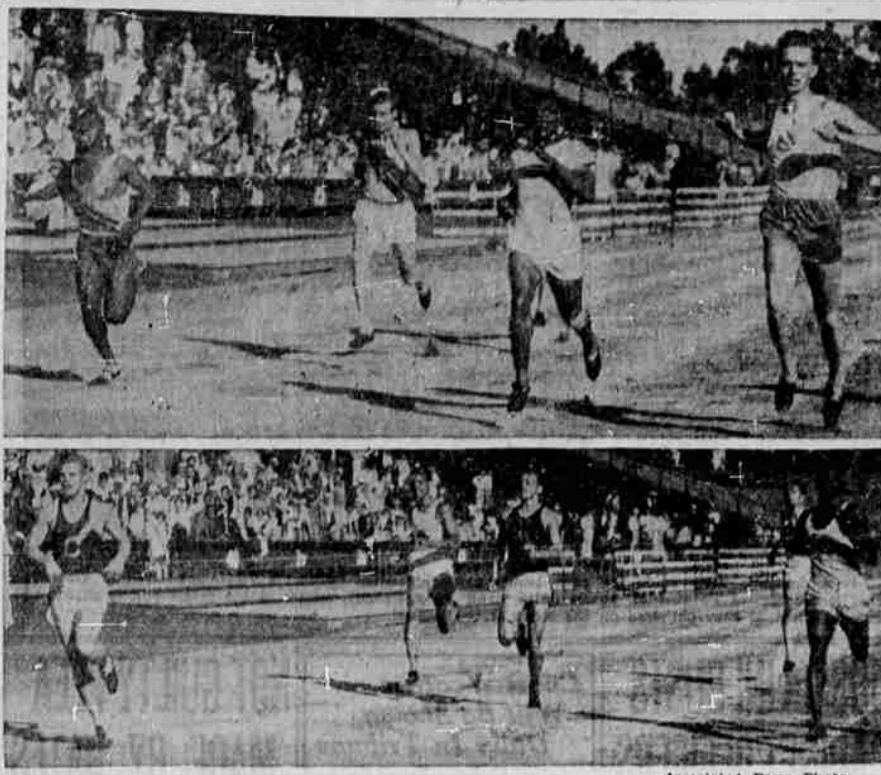
Portland's Beavers were two games ahead of Hollywood in the league standing today by virtue of taking the series opener from the Stars last night, 4 to 1.

Tips on CONTRACT

CARD READING.

Ability to deduce which cards are held by opponents is necessary for success with many contracts. Discards, leads and plays furnish inferences to the declarer even when opponents have not bid.

In point is a hand on which Al Morehead made game in no trump at the Bridge House, New York. By able card reading he made a vienna coup—that is set up a card in the hand of an opponent deliberately in order to squeeze him with discards in other suits.

Morehead found his partner with nothing out a five-card suit, headed by the queen-knave. This was after Morehead had made a jump bid in order to force a response from partner. Here was the hand:

Here are Mr. Morehead's comments on the hand:

- 1—West should have unblocked with the club knave. He should deduce that his partner held four clubs and allow him to lead clubs again. West doesn't want to lead.
- 2—Throwing the lead back to the opponents. South does not like to lead himself.
- 3—The fall of the diamond ten makes the declarer realize that west

held a diamond doubleton. If west holds the king of diamonds, south must lead the nine in order to have a diamond entry in dummy.

When the queen of spades takes the trick the declarer deduces that the knave of hearts is in the west hand, as well as the king of spades. West would not lead a spade away from his king if his heart holding were not worth protecting. And so the declarer, rather than attempting a losing finesse of the heart ten, chooses the squeeze, leading the ace of spades before the diamond. This is the vienna coup, establishing a card in an opponent's hand in order to squeeze him and make the contract.

This was the situation after nine tricks had been played:

If south had led his diamond before playing the spade ace he would have lost a heart trick. The play of the spade ace first, setting up the king in the west hand, squeezed west. If he had discarded his king of spades in the north hand would have been good.

The lead of the diamond on the 11th trick forced west to unguard his knave of hearts so that it dropped on south's queen and the ten of hearts took the last trick.

RAJAH CONVINCED DAYS ON DIAMOND PASSED FOR HIM

Having made what many predict was his valedictory as an active player, Rogers Hornsby, one of the greatest infielders of all time, has turned the job of winning the National League flag over to his youngsters.

The Rajah, disabated with Stanley Hack's play at third base after Bill Jurges was laid up with gunshot wounds, stepped in to plug the hole, but after listening to the Chicago fans for five days decided to return to the cooling confines of the dugout. Feeble at Bat.

In the last four games he played, the once peerless batman collected only two hits, and his fielding was a thing of the past. When he made two errors Monday and failed to handle several other chances properly, he must have made up his mind. Today he is on the bench, and beside him sits the mighty Burtleigh Grimes, waiting to do an occasional job of relief pitching.

With the youthful Hack back in the lineup yesterday and the batting order juggled, the Cubs took a close one from the Giants, 5 to 4.

Pirates, Phils Divide.

Bill Swift pitched the Pirates to a 5 to 2 victory in their first bout with the Phils, his seventh straight, but the eastern delegates came back to take the nightcap, 6 to 5, in 11 innings.

Ed Brandt was in top form and the Boston Braves knocked Cincinnati a little deeper into the cellar, 2 to 0. The St. Louis Cardinals, after being held to one hit for five innings, drove Dazzy Vance from the box in the seventh and defeated Brooklyn, 5 to 3.

Playing without the injured Babe Ruth, the Yankees took their fourth straight from the Chicago Sox, 6 to 3, with Lefty Gomez hanging up his 15th victory. The Washington Senators celebrated "Sam Rice" day" by dropping their third in a row to Detroit, 3 to 2.

The Cleveland Indians blanked Boston, 7 to 0.

The Philadelphia Athletics slugged out two decisions over St. Louis, 9 to 8 and 16 to 6. The Browns have lost 10 straight.

JONES WINS BELT FROM ROBIN REED

SALEM, Ore., July 20.—(AP)—Henry Jones, of Provo, Utah, won the mid-west Wrestling association's world championship welterweight belt here last night by defeating Robin Reed, of Reedspore Ore., in a decision match.

Reed and Jones won each one fall, Jones taking the first in one hour, 15 minutes, with an airplane spin and Reed winning the next in 30 minutes with a flying mare.

During the remaining 17 minutes of the bout, Jones was the aggressor and apparently had the advantage and the referee awarded him the bout and the title which Reed won about a year ago in Cincinnati.

Reed weighed 144½, Jones, 142½.
