With railroad rates lower than at any time in history, with hotel rates in Washington cut in half, the preliminary financing of such a project should not call for any excessive amount of money.

THE Mail Tribune, as previously stated, doubts the feasibility of putting such a project over, UNDER PRESENT CONDITIONS. But that is only a matter of opinion.

All right, let's assume they are right, and we are wrong. There is some local difference of opinion, regarding the possibility of putting such a proposition over, but there is no DIFFERENCE OF OPINION, regarding the desirability of securing \$6,500,000 of government money for this project, or any other, if it can be done.

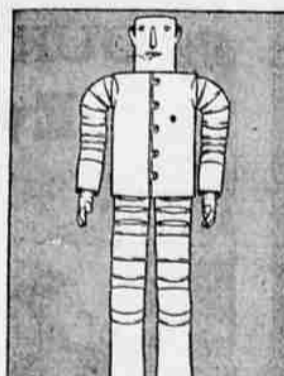
