FIGHT ON BEETLE SHOWING RESULTS IN CRATER REGION

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK - (Special) - Current pine beetle control activities in the lodgepole and white bark pine forests of the Crater lake area are not only expected to completely check the spread of pine beetle destruction, but the development of a new oil burning treatment as well, to a large extent supplanting the solar system hitherto used.

Having proved its efficiency, it is thought the treatment will prove most effective in controlling beetle infestations of yellow pine with a marked reduction in cost.

The earliest control system consisted of felling and bucking infested trees, decking them into piles to be burned. The most of this method was prohibitive, running as high as two dollars per tree, as well as being inefficient in the disadvantage of neighboring trees being subject to scorching and more susceptible to new broods of beetles.

In preference to this, the solar system was found more practical. Trees were felled in northerly and southerly directions, limbed and left exposed to sunlight, capable of killing beetle larvae if air temperature was over 75 degrees. This treatment was effective on the upper side of the log, necessitating rolling the other half to effect a complete killing.

Experiments by Entomologist F. F. Keene, Portland, W. J. Buckhorn, bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, in charge of Crater Lake insect control, revealed the oil burning system to be more efficient, in addition to being economical. In this method, trees are felled in such position to be above the ground as much as possible and clear of brush and green timber. A small fire is started on the base of the log with a spray stream of oil directed against it, generating such heat through the bark to effectively destroy all larvae.

MUSIC PROGRAMS NIGHTLY AT LAKE

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK. (Sp.) - An entertainment feature enjoyed by thousands of park visitors each season is provided in the presentation of nightly vocal and instrumental recitals by employees of the Crater Lake National Park company during the summer.

The singers and instrumentalists, all college trained in their respective lines, possess rare ability, with several especially trained in addition to regular university study.

Singers, whose songs have no relation to modern jazz, include Miss Lucille Cummings, Salen, contralto; Miss Margaret Hammerbacher, Grants Pass, contralto; Miss Agnes Petzold, Oregon City, mezzo-soprano; Kenneth Rodmer, Portland, tenor; Karl Kippel, Eugene, basso.

In addition to possessing a strong baritone voice, Clifford Nash, Eugene, is talented on the violin and often takes part in duets. Victor Bryan, Eugene, is a flutist as well as a tenor.

Instrumentalists include Miss Beulah Wynd, Eugene, violin; Miss Roberta Spicer, Eugene, cello; Harold Syres, Eugene, pianist and accompanist.

The discovery late last night was made, according to San Gerónimo dispatches, by a searching party which has been combing the jungle since McElroy was found last Thursday in a starving condition, by an Indian woodsman.

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REFUSE TO LIFT HAND BILL BAN

JERSEY CITY, N. J., July 20 - (AP) - Led by Mayor Hague, the city commission refused today to rescind an ordinance forbidding house to house distribution of advertising circulars and hand bills.

The mayor told several merchants who urged the abolition of the ordinance - that in the past there had gotten into homes in the guise of hand bill distributors.

Newspaper advertising, the mayor told the merchants, is a better form of advertising than hand bills of circulars.
