

CUBE BUTTER IN PENNY ADVANCE PORTLAND MART

PORTLAND, July 21.—(P)—Advance of 1 cent pound in the price of cube butter on the Produce Exchange here was not at all unexpected in view of the scramble recently for top score offerings generally along the coast. The advance to 18c for extras was therefore due. However, the rise of a similar amount in undercores was more of a sympathetic movement rather than any special need for such a rise. The shortage of extras and standards gave a somewhat better undertone to the entire trade and forced the movement of undergrades into consuming channels.

For several days there has been rather keen strength in the California marketing owing to the great decrease in the churning there and along the coast. Much northwest stock has been moved in that direction as a result of the higher prices which naturally forced the upward swing here.

Butterfat made the customary advance of 1 cent which is now effective. Generally firm tone is suggested in the market for eggs here, with strength displayed at most leading points along the Pacific slope. Receipts continue to dwindle.

Cut of 1c lb. in the buying price of light weight hens to 7-9c lb. is shown for the day, confirming last week's late forecasts of this desire on the part of killers in spite of the decreased supply.

Months ahead of the normal, new crop young turkeys are being offered to the local trade by Willamette valley growers, but none appear anxious to start the movement inasmuch as there is still considerable old stock coming and the storage plants are loaded.

Moon's Shadow to Sweep New England At 2,000 Mile Speed During Eclipse

NEW YORK.—(AP)—The meaning of future stratosphere travel speeds of 2,000 miles an hour—something actually moving that fast—can be seen in northeast New England August 31.

This speeding object will be the black, oncoming edge of the moon's shadow during the total eclipse of the sun which crosses upper Vermont New Hampshire, Maine and a corner of Massachusetts about 3:30 p. m. eastern standard time.

Watchers on mountains and in airplanes should have a good view of the flying edge traveling over broad miles spread out below them. The shadow's speed is announced by astronomers as 2,967 feet a second, slightly more than half a mile. Its shape will be that of a gigantic football, advancing side on, an eclipse 100 miles long and about 60 acres.

Starts Near Pole
It starts near the north pole, comes down across Canada, and passes out to sea to make a 6000 mile journey in three hours. Its last slant of land for the United States is Chatham, Mass., on Cape Cod.

Spectators with a little imagination can sense the earth's rotation while they look at this shadow. Those in New England will be traveling eastward with the earth's rotation at around 700 miles an hour.

If they face east, the shadow overtakes them from behind like an express train at a diamond-shaped crossing. It comes down from the northwest and rushes ahead to branch off to the southeast. Their own travel with earth's rotation being partly in the same direction cuts down the shadow's speed.

This shadow is a black cone extending behind the moon an average of 231,650 miles. When there is an eclipse the earth cuts through the cone. The cut, astronomers calculate, may be made anywhere from just grazing to 16,000 miles inside the tip.

The earth can also miss the tip entirely, leaving it suspended aloft like the lower end of tornado cloud funnel. Under such circumstances the tip of the shadow may pass anywhere from a few miles to 20,000 miles overhead. The result then is an "annular" eclipse. The sun shows all around the edge of the moon.

Word was received today from Circuit Judge E. C. LaTourrette of Clarkamas county that he would be here next Monday to hear the case of Niedermeyer, Inc., against Earl H. Fehl and the Pacific Record-Herald, which centers around a chattel mortgage and promissory note for approximately \$4000.

The plaintiff asserts that Fehl was amply paid and same deducted from the note due and owing.

Fehl is represented by Attorneys T. J. Enright, Kelly & Kelly and Herbert K. Hanna, Niedermeyer, Inc., is represented by Attorneys George M. Roberts and William McAllister. Length of the trial is problematical. In the hearing of the preliminary motions, defense counsel intimated it would require three days. The court intimated it would take half that long.

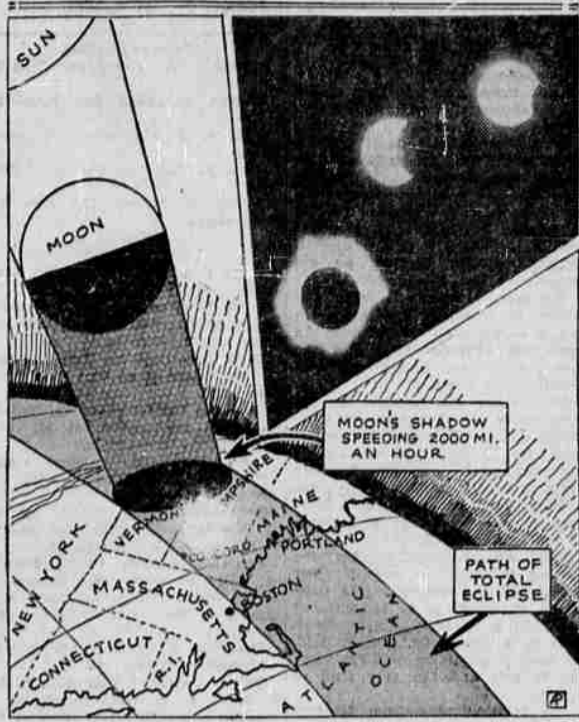

27,327 AUTOS IN TRAFFIC COUNT ON SO. OREGON ROADS

A total of 27,327 automobiles were checked at the 20 stations in southern Oregon Saturday between the hours of 6 a. m. and 10 p. m. in the 16-hour count conducted by the Oregon state highway department, according to figures received today from J. G. Bromley, resident maintenance engineer of the state highway system, with headquarters in Grants Pass.

Although the station one mile south of Medford led in the 8-hour count conducted last month, that checking point was far behind the time, with the Pacific highway location north of the junction with the fairgrounds road south of Grants Pass showing a total of 4131 cars passing in the 16 hours. At the fairgrounds check here 2930 cars were recorded.
