SHELL WINDOWS FOR SUN ROOMS

LOS ANGELES. - (AP) - Panels of shells from clam fish from the Philippine Islands are being used here for enclosed portable sun baths.

The shells, although not transparent, transmit both ultraviolet and infra-red rays.

Charles P. Stewart found windows in Philippine homes made from the shell of a clam fish, said to be found only on the islands, and tests made by Dr. Edwin Pettit of the Wilson observatory indicate it will not become solarized or opaque from continued exposure, as does the special glass usually used to transmit ultraviolet rays.

The lower shell of the Philippine clam is thin and flat and can be cut into four or five-inch squares.

Minstrel Show True American Entertainment

CINCINNATI, Ohio. - (AP) - Dan Quinlan, who has been in the minstrel show business for 25 years, is one who believes minstrel shows are far from done.

"Minstrels are the only truly American form of entertainment," he declares. "They originated on the old southern plantations among the negroes. All other types of entertainment had their birth in foreign countries."

LIONS HEAR PLEA FOR HONEST BEER

LOS ANGELES, July 21. - (AP) - Legislation and taxation of "honest beer" was advocated today at the International Association of Lions' clubs convention, by Edward V. Robertson of Cody, Wyo., who said he believed the ideal system of taxation can "only be reached by a complete sales tax method."

"I am not going to enter into the merits or demerits of the prohibition question," Robertson said. "I think every sane thinking man and woman realizes the present conditions cannot continue. We can raise \$500,000,000 toward balancing the national budget by legalizing honest beer and taxing it."

MABEL WILLEBRANDT FOR HOOVER RETURN

WASHINGTON, July 21. - (AP) - Mabel Walker Willebrandt favors the re-election of Herbert Hoover as president, but apparently not to the extent of breaking her "political silence."

To a reporter she would go campaigning in Hoover's behalf, a report which was coupled with conjecture on her present stand on prohibition. Mrs. Willebrandt, one of the leading women campaigners for Mr. Hoover in 1928, made answer:

"I reaffirm the political silence which I have continuously and consistently maintained."
