

### WORK IS BEGUN ON DEAD INDIAN MARKET ROUTE

The county court has started work on the Dead Indian market road, from the Dead Indian summit east; \$20,000 of market road funds are available to be used in grading for a distance of three miles, through a rocky and hard dirt formation. The work will last until snow flies and 15 men will be employed with machinery on the project.

Survey of the Butte Falls market road will be made as soon as the state highway engineers complete the surveys of Portland-to-the-Sea routes. Difficulty is being encountered in determining which of three proposed routes should be surveyed. When and if the survey is made, clearing will start on the Butte Falls road to prepare for road work next spring. The Dead Indian and Butte Falls market roads tap the lake and recreational areas of eastern Jackson county.

Work on the Sams Valley secondary highway from Gold Hill is underway.

The county clerk continues idle. Eagle Point and the Rogue River district petitioned the county court for cilling of roads within the corporate limits, to curb the dust evil. Because of the low state of the county finances, the county court agreed to provide the cilling equipment if the petitioners would pay for the oil and labor. The petitioners have reposed in the pigeonholes since.

### NEW RELIEF BILL WILL START FLOW OF NEEDED FUNDS

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Measurements from the corporation directorate were ordered by the new law at the president's request. He said they had too many other things to do.

The new law—Makes \$300,000,000 available for loans to states to relieve unemployment distress; increases funds of the corporation from \$2,000,000,000 to \$3,800,000,000; allocates \$1,500,000,000 for public construction and self-liquidating private loans, the financing of agriculture through credit corporations; allows \$120,000,000 for federal highway aid advances to states; permits expenditure of \$10,000,000 on national parks and forest roads and trails; makes possible the use of \$188,224,000 for public buildings and waterway improvement when the treasury condition permits.

Credit loosened. Likewise, it lets the federal reserve banks, subject to approval of the reserve board, discount eligible paper for individuals and corporations. When the measure was signed the president had not yet settled his difference with Democrats over whether it would be necessary to make public the corporation loans or simply send them to the house and senate each month.

No ceremony accompanied presidential approval. A White House secretary simply summoned newspaper men and told them the bill had been signed.

### ASHLAND BANK CLAIMS FILED

The State Banking department today filed with the county clerk, as provided, a statement of claims received up to July 2, in the liquidation of the Citizens National Bank of Ashland. It consists of 25 type-written pages, and the claims range from \$1 to \$10,000.

The recapitulation shows that depositors' claims approved amount to \$165,665.99, in the commercial department and in the savings department \$167,845.42.

Secured claims paid in the commercial department amount to \$11,153.40 and in the savings department to \$68,521.70.

Preferred claims, listed for payment total \$6,485.64.

An inferior claim of \$299 is listed.

### BROWNELL DENIES ROLE IN THEFT OF SIGNED PETITIONS

head of the Portland office of the consolidation group.

Brownell's arrest resulted from the startling disclosure of Robert Tallman, night watchman in the Hlocum-Brownell office, who finally admitted that his original story that two men had held him up, looted the safe of the petitions, and escaped on the night of July 4, was a hoax. He confessed, police said, that the petitions were taken by three men under a prearranged plan.

Motive Unrevealed. Police say the motive behind the alleged theft has not yet been revealed and, as a matter of fact, is at this time unknown.

Nor have all details of the petition transaction been revealed by the district attorney's office. From an authoritative source, however, it has been learned that Tallman was promised \$1000 in cash and regular employment as a reward for his part in the affair. The temptation is said to have been too great for Tallman to overcome. He is destitute with a wife and five children to support.

The story relates that at the time the petitions were removed from the safe as the first scene in the hoax play, he was offered part of the money on account.

Received No Money. This he is said to have refused at the time, observing that if he were watched by police after reporting the "robbery," and if the money were found on his person after he had told of having been held up and robbed, serious and natural suspicion would be directed at his story.

As a result of this declaration, it is said Tallman has received nothing whatever.

MacPherson left for his Albany home shortly after signing the complaint. The only comment he made was: "I believe the evidence justifies the serving of the complaint. The whole transaction will be revealed in the preliminary hearing of Mr. Brownell." This hearing probably will be held early next week.

### NORTON HEARING KLAMATH CASES

Circuit Judge H. D. Norton will occupy the Klamath county bench this week and part of next, hearing law suits in which the Klamath county judge is disqualified.

Circuit Judge E. C. Latourette of Oregon City will occupy the local bench, and Monday will start hearing the suit of Niedermeyer, Inc., against Earl H. Fehl and the Pacific Record-Herald, for the collection of a \$5000 promissory note and chattel mortgage.

Roy A. Farr, game warden, awarded a \$18,000 libel suit verdict, and Sheriff Ralph G. Jennings, who served an execution of judgment in the line of official duty last spring, against Fehl and his newspaper plant, are listed as defendants in a minor capacity.

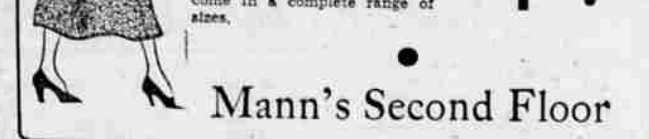
