

WELFARE GROUP CONVEYS THANKS TO ENSIGN PACK

Stressing the urgent need in Medford for a co-operative program of relief and support of the Community Chest in Medford during the coming year, Ensign J. R. Pack gave his farewell address before members of the Allied Welfare Association at luncheon at the Hotel Medford today. Ensign Pack leaves soon for Pocatello, Idaho, to accept the position of Salvation Army headquarters. Indications of necessity for even more relief work during the next winter, were listed by Ensign Pack, who stated that organizations must work together on the problem and are easily able to do so through the Allied Welfare Association.

The need for providing work or wholesome recreation for children of the unemployed in Medford was also brought out by Ensign Pack in a statement to the effect that there is a definite lack in Medford of provision for children between the ages of 14 and 20.

However satisfactory the program of work now being considered by the Medford Association of the Unemployed and other special agencies for relief of the jobless, there will still remain the necessity for Community Chest work. Ensign Pack also stated, urging persons who have not paid their contributions to do so at once. At the close of his address Ensign Pack expressed great regret at leaving Medford and a hope that the relief organization members will carry on in the same spirit they have in the past. He appointed a nominating committee composed of Mrs. Dorothy Mitchell, Miss Lillian Roberts and L. M. Westburner, to bring in a list of candidates for offices for the coming year at the next meeting, which will be called by Miss Mildred Carlton, vice-president of the association.

Mrs. A. E. Reamann, county chairman of the women's division of Governor Meier's state committee for relief of the unemployed, was called upon and responded with an expression of appreciation of the splendid work done in Medford by Ensign Pack. She assured the association that the organization she represents, which is interested primarily in the conservation of food, will be glad to co-operate with all other relief groups of the city.

J. C. Mann, representing the Community Chest, asked for a rising vote in appreciation of Ensign Pack's service here and the response was unanimous. He announced that a meeting of the chest board will be held next Monday in an attempt to arrive at a solution of present problems and a program for collecting pledges, now in arrears.

Miss Carlton, president of the Jackson County Public Health association, reminded the guests in attendance that in order to accomplish anything here during the coming year it is urgent that each organization be represented at meetings of the Allied Welfare group.

Rev. Alexander G. Bennett, representing the Kiwanis club, brought a message of farewell to Ensign Pack from the club and voiced the regrets of all members regarding his departure and hope for a successful year in Pocatello. At the close of the meeting, personal goodbyes were conveyed to Ensign Pack in many friendly handshakes.
