STATE ACCIDENT COMMISSION PAY SCHEDULE SLICED

SALEM, Ore., July 22.—(AP)—The state industrial accident commission today announced its office staffs in Portland and Salem would be put on a six-hour a day basis with corresponding reduction in pay beginning August 1. The commission announced this was made necessary in order to keep the administrative expense within 10 per cent law limitation. The commissioners, of which there are three, will likewise take the corresponding reduction in pay but will not reduce their hours. Field auditors outside of Portland are excepted from the rule and in the auditing department.

The commission announced adoption of this plan rather than to further reduce the personnel of its department. During 1931 the commission reduced the number of its employees 20 per cent; and their administrative expense by more than \$100,000.

A warning to employers was issued by the commission to the effect that all employers who engage in a hazardous occupation without giving the commission written notice of their operations are liable to the accident commission for costs of all accidents prior to time of giving notice, in addition to being guilty of a misdemeanor. Twenty-five employers have been arrested within the past few months and convictions secured in virtually all of them for violation of this provision, the commission announced.

NATIONAL CONFAB FOR WORK RELIEF URGED ON HOOVER

BOSTON, July 22.—(AP)—President Hoover has been asked to consider calling a national conference which would effect an organization to aid in solving the unemployment problem through the medium of the flexible work day. The conference, which was attended by leaders in many walks of life, was called by the New Hampshire unemployment relief committee and the Massachusetts commission on the stabilization of unemployment. During the session it discussed "the New Hampshire plan for reemployment," which was based on the principle of flexibility.

The conference called the New England joint conference on reemployment, found that "unemployment continues with increasing problems, despite all efforts to curb the lessening of business activity and the cooperative national action to achieve job security by job sharing seems imperative."

Carey Goat Lands In Clover Patch

EDEN PRECINCT, July 22.—(Sp.)—Mrs. Clinton Carey had a very fine milk goat that had served the family for six years with all the milk they needed. WHITES ACCLIMATED IN TROPICS, CLAIM

MANILA (AP)—That the tropics are not necessarily unhealthy for whites is the conclusion drawn from a new survey of Americans in Manila. The survey revealed that the deaths here, averaging 9.22 a thousand for 1921-30, were less than within the registration area of the United States, where the figure was 11.89.

Major George F. Lull and Dr. L. Lopez-Bical, who made the study, said the comparison should be discounted somewhat because of the difference in age groups, people of the United States as a whole being older than the Manila Americans.
