

LABOR EXCHANGE RELIEF PLAN FOR UNION CO. NEEDY

Central Warehouse and Issuance of Labor Certificates Provided—Will Aid Farmers in Harvest

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 22.—(AP)—A labor exchange plan suggested by Hiram T. Smith, maintenance engineer of the state highway department shops here, has been adopted by the Union county relief committee appointed by Governor Julius L. Meier.

In brief, it provides for a central exchange warehouse, which will be managed by Lester H. Bramwell, former banker, and the issuance of "labor certificates" instead of money as payment for labor. Fuel and food also could be purchased with the certificates. The "money" would be issued in various denominations, each bill supported by its face value in labor or produce.

Through this system farmers expect to have their crops harvested, turn in a certain percentage of their produce for labor certificates, pay their employees with these certificates and the employees in turn may purchase food or fuel from the exchange warehouse.

The plan, which is expected to reduce unemployment materially in the county, probably will be in operation by the first of next week.

LAST MAN ENDS LAST MAN CLUB

STILLWATER, Minn., July 22.—(AP) Captain Charles Lockwood "last man" of the Last Man's club, started home today after closing the records of the old organization of Civil War veterans for what he believes was the final time.

Thirty-three chairs draped in black, each representing a charter member of the club which rallied for four decades around a bottle of Burgundy wine, stood before the 89-year-old veteran last night as he paid tribute to his departed comrades.

The wine was saved as a toast for the last man when the club was formed in 1888. Lockwood slipped a toast from it in 1930 when for the first time he was alone. Last night he drank his toast in water. He feels he will be unable next year to come from his home at Chamberlain, S. D., for another meeting on the ground where the club was founded, and the toast conceived in jest.

ELDERS OF SYNOD PLANNING BRANCH

ALBANY, Ore., July 22.—(AP)—Action was taken here yesterday by the Oregon synod of the Presbyterian church to form an association of elders of the synod, in the belief that this organization will eventually grow into a strong branch of the church.

A report of the committee on pensions was given by C. C. Bryant of Albany, and the Rev. Reid S. Dickson of Philadelphia, secretary of the board of pensions. During the past year, it was said, to the 30 belonging to relief department No. 3 in Oregon, \$18,610 had been paid, \$12,000 in excess of what the Oregon synod put into the fund during the year.

Trustees of Albany college, to fill vacancies and expired terms until 1935, included Judge J. W. Maloney of Pendleton.

CANADA EXPORTS TO U. S. GROWING

OTTAWA, July 22.—(AP)—A feature of the export trade of Canada in June, was an increase in the merchandise sold to the United States, according to a report issued by the Dominion bureau of statistics today.

The value was \$15,751,485, as compared with \$14,189,019 in May and \$12,985,049 in April.

With this increase the Canadian exports to the United States in June were greater than to all the countries of the British Empire combined.

FRISCO PREPARES FOR HUGE THROG AT SHRINE FIESTA

With all traces of the depression erased San Francisco is preparing today to greet 500,000 visitors to the Shrine convention of North America July 28, 27 and 28.

According to officials of tourist agencies and railroads, at least thirty special trains will bring Shriners and tourists from distant points to San Francisco.

A swift-moving three-day show, with twenty-four hours of each day crammed with merriment and entertainment has been planned by William H. Woodfield, Jr., director general of the convention and the executive committee.

Five major events are scheduled. These include four brilliant and spectacular parades which will center in the Shrine stadium at the Civic Center.

Most of the popular stars of Hollywood will arrive for the motion picture parade in which fourteen major film studios have entered brilliant fleets.

Several sports events have been planned for the convention, most important of which is the Masonic World-Shrine invitational golf tournament, in which golfers from various sections of America will compete for a \$1000 solid gold trophy. Any golfer, regardless of fraternal affiliation, is eligible to enter, and headquarters have been established at 614 Humboldt Bank building, San Francisco, where information will be provided.

Restaurants, theatres, night clubs and other places of entertainment are preparing to offer the visitors a typical San Francisco good time. A quaint feature in the preparations underway was the offer of Dr. J. C. Geiger, San Francisco director of public health, and himself a Shriner, to test free all liquor belonging to Shriners which may be thought dubious.

KANSAS CITY, July 22.—(AP)—The federal farm board and various reclamation projects were described as enemies of the farmers, at the congressional hearing here into government competition with private business.

John B. Gage, a lawyer, a representative of the livestock interests, yesterday assailed the National Livestock Marketing association, a farm board agency, by declaring that "any organization that receives at least 98 per cent of its working capital from the government truly can be said to represent the government in business."

The depression in livestock prices, he declared, has developed since the agency had built up a credit structure of \$20,000,000 by the use of government money. He charged that "the inability to obtain credit through normal channels had caused many private producers to become slaves of this farm board agency."
