JOBLESS RELIEF ACT PROVISIONS GIVEN IN RECORD

Congressional Records containing the unemployment relief act have been received in this city and the provisions applicable to this section are as follows:

"Sec. 201 (a) The reconstruction finance corporation is authorized and empowered—

"(1) To make loans to, or contracts with, states, municipalities and political subdivisions of states, public agencies of states, or other public corporations, boards and commissions, and public municipal instrumentalities of one or more states, to aid in financing projects authorized under federal, state, or municipal law which are self-liquidating in character, such loans or contracts to be made through the purchase of their securities, or otherwise, and for such purpose the reconstruction finance corporation is authorized to bid for such securities: Provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prohibit the reconstruction finance corporation, in carrying out the provisions of this paragraph, from purchasing securities having a maturity of more than 10 years;

"(2) To make loans to corporations formed wholly for the purpose of providing housing for families of low income, or for reconstruction of slum areas, which are regulated by state or municipal law as to rents, charges, capital, structure, rate of return, and areas and methods of operation, to aid in financing projects by such corporations which are self-liquidating in character;

"(3) To make loans to private corporations to aid in carrying out the construction, replacement or improvement of bridge, tunnels, docks, viaducts, waterworks, canals, and markets, devoted to public use and which are self-liquidating in character."
