FEHL MORTGAGE FORECLOSURE ON MONDAY DOCKET

Hearing of the civil action of Niedermeyer, Inc., against Earl H. Fehl and the Pacific Record-Herald for collection of a chattel mortgage and promissory note of \$5000, plus the interest, will start Monday morning in circuit court before Circuit Judge E. C. Latourette of Oregon City, assigned to the case by the supreme court when Judge H. D. Norton was disqualified by reason of an affidavit of prejudice filed by the defense.

The action is of local interest because of the prominence of the litigants and the fact that it revolves around construction of the Holly theatre, and other Sixth street activities of a few years ago.

Niedermeyer Inc., seeks collection, holding that they have a priority right over the \$15,000 libel suit judgment held by Roy Parr, game warden, against Fehl and the newspaper plant and property.

Fehl in an answer and counterclaim asserts that he has approximately \$22,000 coming for services of a diversified nature, rendered before and during the construction of the Holly theatre. These include promotional work, services in bringing about the sale of the lot, securing of leases for the theater and offices therein, and labor performed during the construction period.
