

### PRESBYTERIANS IN FIRM OPPOSITION TO PROH REPEAL

After a spirited contest between Albany, Eugene, Portland and Baker for next year's meeting of the Presbyterian Synod of Oregon, this year's meeting adjourned Friday after a four days session at Albany college, to meet there again in July, 1932.

Before adjourning, the synod went on record by unanimous vote against repeal of the 18th amendment or of the Oregon dry law, and declaring that "most of the propaganda appearing so generally of late in the press and otherwise, against the 18th amendment and prohibition is not sincere, is untrue and has virtually no foundation in fact."

"The synod approves the 18th amendment as a vital part of the law of our country, outlawing the liquor traffic and contributing, in proportion to its faithful observance, to the welfare, safety and well being of our people, their sobriety and prosperity, and the true happiness of their homes, and causing, as shown by government and other investigation a greatly decreased consumption of intoxicants and consequent decrease in disease and death due to drunkenness."

Re-submission of the 18th amendment was opposed by the synod "before there has first been presented some definite alternative plan worthy to command general acceptance as being sure to deal more effectively with the evils attending legalization of the purchase and sale of intoxicants."

"We implore every Christian, every American citizen," said the synod, "to stand true to God and right in this crisis, by his and her influence, vote and earnest efforts to help stem the tide of deception, lawlessness and evil purposes which is now threatening the welfare, if not the very existence of our government and American institutions."

President Hoover's recent proposals for drastic reduction of armaments were endorsed, and compulsory military training in times of peace was opposed.

Notwithstanding the hard times, Albany college had, last year, one of the best years in its history, in point of student attendance and work done. With the completion and dedication of the fine new Hansen gymnasium, "Albany" is splendidly equipped in this respect among the colleges of the Northwest.

Other pressing needs of the college are a new women's building and greater endowment to help provide for the fast growing needs of the institution, and insure opportunity for college training to the thousands of young men and women eager for it but unable to get a good college education without help in some way.

Albany college has made fine progress in securing new buildings and beautifying its campus in recent years, but greatly needs more to do its best work. It needs a new women's building, chapel, etc., to meet its present opportunity.

Albany college is taking fine rank among others in the northwest, as for example in the winning by an Albany student this year of an inter-collegiate contest in oratory, with 10 colleges competing.

Reports of Oregon Presbyterian churches for the year showed a total membership of 21,686, and a Sunday school membership of about 27,000; with church buildings and property valued at over \$5,000,000.

residents, chiefly in the Ashland district, came under the California ruling Saturday and Sunday.

The securing of the refund, if and when, will protect the Oregonians from coming under the California personal tax law for autos.

The auto license moratorium in this state will end July 31st, and according to present plans, August 1st will see the start of enforcement of the license laws. It is unofficially reported that some degree of leniency will be extended to those to whom purchase of a license at this time would be a financial hardship, if the auto is used in a gainful occupation. No leniency will be extended to those able to buy, but still sailing under the old license.

The Washington license is reported as very popular upstate among autoists, particularly in the Portland area. They can drive to Vancouver, Wash., and buy a three month's license for \$1.50, and at the expiration of that time can pay another \$1.50 and have a full year's license.
