

PHILLIES UNCORK HEAVY OFFENSIVE ON HOME GROUND

Four Heavy Hitters of Fast Coming Outfit Promise Hectic Reception for Invading Moundsmen

The Phillies, starting another extended stand in their own Baker Bowl, may supply the big news of the next few weeks in the National league.

This club has found itself and is coming along. In a virtual tie for third place today, it promises to be higher when Klein, Hurst, Whitney and Bartell get through with a few dozen visiting pitchers. Win 10 in 14 starts.

When they opened their last home stand against the west almost two months ago, the Phillies were in seventh place. They have won 10 of their last 14 starts, mostly on the road.

A typical assault, which netted eight runs off Owen Carroll's delivery in the first two innings, gave Burt Shotton's sluggers a 10 to 5 victory over Cincinnati in yesterday's opener. Klein, Hurst and Whitney each hit a home run.

The Pirates and Giants, inaugurating a "crucial" series of seven games in four days at the Polo grounds, split a double-header. Bill Terry's homer with two aboard, helped the Giants take the first, 7 to 5, but the league leaders came back to capture the second, 7 to 5, in 10 innings.

Cubs Move Up. The Chicago Cubs picked up a half game on Pittsburgh by trimming the Boston Braves, 7 to 2, behind Pat Malone's five-hit pitching performance. Brooklyn's surprising Dodgers trounced the St. Louis Cardinals twice, 12 to 6 and 5 to 4.

Two contests survived the rain in the American league, and in one of them the Boston Red Sox turned their newest pitcher, Johnny Welch, loose on the Chicago White Sox for a 4 to 1 victory.

George Blaholder's steady pitching, plus his timely single that scored Levey in the second inning with the winning run, gave the St. Louis Browns a 3 to 2 decision over Washington.

COLORED TEAM HERE THURSDAY

Joe Lillard, former University of Oregon football, basketball and baseball star, may see mound duty here Thursday with the Clifton Colored Giants team in their clash with the Medford Merchants at the fairgrounds scheduled for 5:30 p.m. In case Lillard does not hurl for the Giants, "Steel Arm" Davis, negro giant, will serve up his famed fast shoots. In addition to Davis' chucking ability he is also reputed as a hitter, being credited with 41 circuit clouts in the Chicago colored league last year.

BATTLER GIVEN GOLD SHOULDER HERE, IS CLAIM

Rematching of Leo Lomski and Jack McCarthy for the main event on Mack Lillard's August 3rd Army ring program may fill local fans with jubilation, but the deal holds no balm for Fritz Tolman, Rocky Mountain light-heavy title claimant, and his manager, Mike Galloway, who have been in Medford several days in search of a spot on a local card. Galloway claimed yesterday that Prop. Lomski-McCarthy had promised his boy a match with the winner of the last Lomski-McCarthy battle, but nevertheless had gone ahead with plans for rematching the same pair.

Galloway, who is a hotel owner of Eureka and manages fighters because of his interest in the ring game, declares he will post \$250 that Tolman can whip either Lomski or McCarthy, and is willing to sign for a fight on a winner-take-all basis, or any other way.

Meanwhile, interest in the forthcoming encounter continues to grow, with partisans ready to back on judgment with cash. The unsatisfactory manner in which the "Aberdeen Assassin" disposed of McCarthy after being all but out himself, has caused more discussion hereabouts than any ring affair in recent years.

In addition to the main event, Lillard has lined up two supporting bouts which in themselves will carry keen anticipation. Herb White, dynamic little lightweight from Butte Falls, who, although engaging in only six fights, has shown evidence of big town caliber, will meet an experienced and hard-hitting fighter, Spider Fleida of Jacksonville, in a six-round go.

Tex Porter, Medford welter, who in times past has given a good account of himself against some highly touted imported talent, will back on Jimmy Hall, Ashland, in the special event. In addition, Lillard is negotiating for a four-round curtain raiser which promises to whet the appetite as sharply as did the opener on the last card between Bob Christine and Charlie Benton.

REVENGE MOTIVE FOR SLAYING OF WEALTHY WOMAN

attack on the Baboocks as they slept at Los Altos, near here, and the assault of early yesterday morning, as retold by authorities, follows:

Last Sunday young Templeton visited the home of his aunt, Mrs. Walter Buckish, whose husband is commissioner of schools of the Philippine Islands, where the Baboocks are visiting. A Filipino houseboy showed the youth about the home as he carefully studied the scene of his contemplated crime.

Monday he bought a 12-inch knife—such as is used for killing cattle—not with the intention of simulating an Oriental murder, but because it

was cheap. It cost 40 cents.

He also bought a five-gallon can of kerosene with which he intended to fire the house. He figured others in the house could escape.

The youth excused himself about midnight from the Oakland lunch room where he worked, and drove to the Buckish home.

Turned on Light.

"I bumped into some furniture and made a lot of noise," the confession continued. "I had to turn on the light to find the right room."

"I stabbed my uncle twice in the chest, then went after my aunt, but she pulled the covers up around her neck and I had trouble getting at her. By the time I got the covers down, Babcock was out of bed. He grappled with me. I had to drop the knife and run."

Leaving his aunt dead and his uncle horribly slashed, the boy fled to the ranch home of a friend, A. R. Fitzpatrick, whom he aroused at 4 a. m. He told his friend he had fought with his uncle and wanted to wash off the blood.

This story, related to Sheriff William J. Emig, led to the arrest of young Templeton early today in the lunch room in Oakland.

The appearance of Templeton fits the meager description Babcock gave of his assailant. The youth is tall, slender, blond and garbed in typical collegiate fashion—corduroys and bareheaded.

Was Model Youth.

In Manila he was known as a model youth.

The senior Templeton's connection with Babcock & Templeton company was severed in 1926, except Templeton remained a minor stockholder.

The brothers-in-law apparently remained on good terms, but young Templeton, Manila dispatches said, seemed to harbor a deep resentment against his uncle.

In Oakland, the lad's mother was reported on the verge of prostration and his father was extremely agitated.

Sheriff Emig said he would away out a murder complaint today and young Templeton would be arraigned in Palo Alto in a few days. Los Altos is in Palo Alto township.
