

# GUN FLOURISHED BY BARNUM SAYS DIVORCE WITNESS

The Barnum machine shops set, the building and two adjoining vacant lots, were worth \$17,300. Mrs. Barnum seeks a third division of this property. The defense maintained that the William Young shops, in the same block, only cost \$2,300 two years ago and questioned Ray at length on the discrepancy in value.

Mrs. Grace Crawford, Mrs. Ray Jackson, Mrs. Edna Mole and Mrs. Lida Hodgkins, neighbors and friends, testified that Mrs. Barnum "was a good housekeeper and mother." They denied she drank liquor on conducted herself "other than as a lady."

Ray Jackson testified that he was at the Barnum home listening to the radio one warm evening, and "without thinking, closed the door." He alleged the Barnums "had a fight over which one of them closed the door." He did not know at the time what it was about, he said. He further alleged that Barnum held a sneering attitude towards his wife and was "what I thought insolent." He said he had had "many pleasant hours with Mr. Barnum and bore him no ill-will."

Dr. C. T. Sweeney testified that he treated Mrs. Barnum for a bruised eye and body bruises, about the time she alleges she was beaten. Dr. Sweeney said he did not know what caused them, as Mrs. Barnum "never told me her troubles or made me a confidant."

It is expected that the plaintiff's witnesses will require all of today. Barnum will be the chief witness for the defense.

# PINE MILLS SHOW BUSINESS GROWTH

PORTLAND, July 29.—(AP)—An increase in current new business, shipments, production and unfilled orders was reported by the Western Pine Association today for the week ending July 23, as compared with the previous week. Seventy-two of the 117 mills reporting to the association were operating, and these at an average of 41.8 per cent of capacity.

Current new business improved 10.1 per cent, or 3,038,000 over the previous week. Production for the week was 38,844,000 feet, an increase of 1,235,000 feet; shipments were 32,440,000 feet, up 1,208,000 feet, and orders were 33,012,000. Unfilled orders increased 372,000 feet.

# ASK FORECLOSURE ON RICHFIELD OIL

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 29.—(AP)—A federal court action to foreclose on Richfield Oil Company properties securing a \$24,000,000 mortgage and trust indenture of 1928 has been started here by the Security First National bank as trustee.

United States District Judge William P. James late yesterday held the action to be particularly pertinent in connection with property adjustment of interests in concluding the sale of Richfield assets to the Consolidated Oil company, a Harry F. Sinclair concern.

# SIMPSON TAKES QUAIL TO STATE GAME FARM

Gene Simpson, superintendent of the state game farm, was accompanied on his recent return to Curvallis from this city by a brood of two weeks' old mountain quail, hatched at the southern Oregon branch of the game farm.

Mr. Simpson was so favorably impressed with the brood upon his visit at the farm here, he decided to take the birds north to be used for propagation of their kind at the state game farm.

The eggs from which the young birds evolved two weeks ago were brought to the southern Oregon branch farm by a rancher who found the nest, deserted. He telephoned the Jackson County Game Protective association, which gladly accepted the eggs.

They were placed under a little bantam hen, whose activities were carefully watched. Twenty-one days elapsed, then 23 and the watchers had given up hope. Firm in the belief that such little eggs would not require more than three weeks' incubation. Then the twenty-sixth day arrived and so did the little birds with a chorus of chirping.

The state game farm has produced few mountain quail and Mr. Simpson is anxious for a larger propagation of the birds, which are larger than the valley quail and more colorful in their plumage.
