JACKSON COUNTY HOMESTEAD OPEN

Notice has been given that the SE 1/4, SW 1/4, Section 2, Township 34 South, Range 1 E. W. M., 40 acres in Jackson county, is restored to entry, subject to the rights of ex-service men of any war in which the United States have been engaged, and to citizens who served with the Allied armies during the World war, on August 23, 1932, and open to the general public, if still vacant, on November 22, 1932, at the United States Land Office, Roseburg, Oregon, and all inquiries relative thereto should be addressed to that office.

Applications may be filed by ex-service men within 20 days prior to the date of the opening, or from August 3, 1932, to August 22, 1932, and by the general public, if the land is still vacant, from November 2, 1932, to November 21, 1932, and all applications filed during this period will be considered as filed simultaneously and a drawing will be held to determine the winner if more than one file.

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FOOD PRESERVING RECIPES OFFERED BY MRS. McCASKEY

In line with the extensive food conservation program, planned here and throughout the state to enable all citizens to be well fed during the coming winter, in spite of depression, several suggestions were presented the Mail Tribune today by Mrs. H. D. McCaskey.

The price of green beans is at present very low, and Mrs. McCaskey submits the following recipe from her old German cookbook, as an ideal way of preserving beans and one which can be carried out by any person who will follow the instructions carefully. It is called "Salted Green Beans." The ingredients are green beans and salt, and the process reads:

"Wash, string and slice the beans, and pack in layers with salt, into stone jars. Each layer of beans must be pressed down with a wooden pestle. Through this process some juice will collect on the beans when they are all in. Now place a piece of white muslin on them, a little board weighted down with a stone on top of that and keep them cool. When using, soak them in water to take out some of the salt. Look to it that there is no mould forming on them. The cloth, board and stone must be cleaned occasionally."

Another recipe suggested by Mrs. McCaskey is for the preparation of sauer kraut, which she says "you may not like, but will find very healthful and good for you and your family." The ingredients are firm, white cabbage heads and salt. Preparation: Remove the bad outer leaves, cut the cabbage in halves, cut out the heart, slice the cabbage in fine shreds and

put into a clean barrel or stone jar. First place whole cabbage leaves over the bottom of the jar or barrel, pack on a layer of sliced cabbage, strew it with salt and pack on another layer, pressing each layer down firmly, and so on until the cabbage is all used up. Press the contents down firmly so the liquor will cover the cabbage, then cover it with a clean piece of white muslin, a board and a stone to hold it down. Look after it occasionally and clean the cloth, board and stone. After the cabbage has fermented enough, which you will know by its sour odor, put it in a cool place.

Both recipes have been tried by Mrs. McCaskey and other Medford women, who recommended them as delicious and practical. Mrs. McCaskey also recommends the crocking of eggs as an economy measure, stating that those put down in liquid glass are very fine for all uses but poaching. While products are cheap and winter ahead, all housewives are advised to join the busy bee in preparing for the cold season, when living will be more difficult than it is now.

FIRE PROTECTION COST IS REDUCED IN STATE FOREST

SALEM, July 29.—(AP)—Expenditure for forest protection in Oregon on lands coming under the jurisdiction of the state forestry department the past six months were a third less than for the first six months of 1931, Lynn F. Cronmiller, state forester, announced.

The expenditures include all those made by various associations of the state as well as those made directly out of the forester's office. Total for the first six months this year were \$87,722 as against \$127,478 a year ago, showing a decrease of \$41,756.

A contributing factor in the re-

duced expenditure has been the favorable fire season. Cronmiller said. However, a reduction in salaries and the cost of supplies and equipment has also contributed its share. The first half of the year 1931 was extremely hazardous. Fires started at the time of the serious windstorm of April 22 and continued through out the season. This made it necessary to immediately place the full personnel in the field.

"So far the 1932 season has been the most favorable the patrol organizations have experienced in a number of years," Cronmiller said.

Past Potentate Of Shrine Dies

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29.—(AP)—Edward N. Strong, 58, prominent Portland insurance man and past illustrious potentate of Al Kader Shrine temple here, died at a hospital here today. Strong suffered a paralytic stroke in Seattle July 16, and was brought to a hospital here Monday. The paralysis was followed by appearance of a blood clot on the brain, causing his death.
