POCKET VETO ON DUPLICATED BILL FOR FARM LOANS

WASHINGTON, July 29. — (AP) — President Hoover has given a pocket veto to a senate bill intended to broaden the base of reconstruction finance corporation loans to farmers.

This was made known today at the White House, after the time limit for signing the measure had expired at midnight. In the absence of the chief executive's signature, the bill automatically died.

It was said in an official White House quarter that Mr. Hoover felt the measure had been passed in the confusion of the last moments of the recent session, and that everything the bill provided already was available under the reconstruction finance corporation act.

The bill was intended to extend to livestock owners, dairy farmers, poultry producers and farmers raising crops not maturing until 1933 loans given under the \$200,000,000 given the department of agriculture by the reconstruction corporation.

It was said that provisions for such loan clearly were made under the reconstruction corporation act, and that the vetoed bill would appropriate the same fund to the department of agriculture, providing a duplication of functions.

GRID COACHES IN RULE DISCUSSION

PASADENA, Cal., July 29. — (AP) — More than a hundred grid mentors of the nation gather here today for the American Football Coaches' association meeting.

An informal discussion of the various points of the game will be staged. The convention adjourns after today until August 7 and 8. The final session of the National Collegiate Athletic association also takes place today.

Yesterday the group staged an informal discussion of the radio, the pertaining to college athletes, with no definite action taken or resolutions passed.

The chief topic of interest today in the grid meeting will be Bill Ingram's expected talk in behalf of a moratorium on grid rules changes.

ROSEBURG SUBURBS REJECT ANNEXATION

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 29. — (AP) — Voters of Riverside, Edenbower and West Roseburg yesterday at a special election rejected a proposal to consolidate those residential districts with the city of Roseburg. The proposed extension of the city limits to include these adjoining areas lying between the city proper and the site of the northwest national soldiers' home was defeated by a vote of 92 to 216.

FIND SECOND BODY IN TILLAMOOK TRAGEDY

TILLAMOOK, Ore., July 29. — (AP) — The body of Percy Abdill, 25, of Dayton, one of the nine persons who lost their lives when a fishing craft overturned at Tillamook bar July 3, was recovered today on the beach at Bay Ocean.

Only two of the nine bodies have been recovered. The other, that of H. J. Brumels, Jr., was washed up two weeks ago.

CULINARY CRAFT....

"A BOWL OF CHERRIES"

"Can you make a cherry pie?" has long been an interesting question. Now, with electric ranges to do the baking, there is a little excuse for a negative answer. Of course you can make a cherry pie! And cherry time brings to mind many other good cherry dishes also. The season is rather short so it is well to purchase the fruit when it is at its best and make up the various combinations which you will enjoy throughout the year. Plain canning instructions were given in this column recently, but we shall repeat today for convenience.


Plain Canning of Cherries.

Wash, stem and pit if desired. Pack in jars and cover with hot syrup within one inch of top. Adjust top and place in oven on a pan, allowing a little space between jars. Process at 275 degrees for one hour, using method given in your range instruction book. Remove from oven, tighten covers and cool.

Cherry Preserves.

4 lbs. sweet cherries
1 qt. vinegar
3 lbs. sugar
1 cup cherry juice

Carefully remove the stones, then place cherries in trays or pans and cover with diluted vinegar (2 cups of water to one cup of vinegar). Allow to stand over night, drain well in the morning and cover the 4 lbs. of fruit with a heavy syrup made of the sugar and cherry juice. Allow to stand



Cherry Sunshine.
1 lb. seeded cherries
1 lb. granulated sugar.

Combine the sugar and cherries and boil together for 15 minutes. Pour out on plates or shallow platters and let stand in the sunshine for one day. Seal. To avoid crystallization of the sugar, 1/2 cup of corn syrup may be substituted for 1/2 cup of sugar.)

Cherry Conserve.

3 cups sour cherries
2 cups seedless raisins
2 cups strawberries
1 cup pineapple
1 cup water

Sugar.
Remove pits from cherries, cut raisins in pieces and also the pineapple slices. Cut strawberries in halves. Add water and boil 30 minutes. Measure sugar to equal the cooked pulp, add and cook until thick. Pour into glasses and seal.

Maraschino Cherries.

3 1/2 lbs. sugar (pitting)
3 1/2 lbs. sugar
1 oz. almond extract
1 oz. red coloring (fruit).

Let cherries and sugar stand over night, then cook all until the cherries have absorbed the color, about 30 minutes. Seal.

Cherry Olives.

1 T. salt
4 cups cold water
1/4 cup white vinegar
Royal Anne cherries.

Fill jars with perfect cherries, leaving stems on. Mix salt, water and vinegar until dissolved then fill jars with the mixture. Seal and leave for three months before using.

Piquant Cherries.

2 quarts red cherries
White vinegar
Sugar.

Pit cherries and place in earthenware bowl and cover with white vinegar, allowing to stand over night. In the morning drain and add an equal weight of granulated sugar to the cherries. Stir at intervals for three

When sugar is completely dissolved and a thick syrup formed, seal cherries in their syrup in sterilized jars. (This recipe is handed down from Colonial days, the 1760's, and the cherries are used in cocktails, salads and as an accompanying sweet with roasted meats.)

Cherry Salad.

Fresh cherries
Canned pears
Blanched almonds
French dressing.

If the pears are small, leave them in halves and fill the centers with chopped almond meats. Four French dressing over the pears and let stand one hour before arranging on salad plate on lettuce. To each portion add several cherries, each with a blanched almond replacing the removed stone. Serve with French dressing.

Frozen Cherry Pudding.

1/2 cup rice
1/4 t. salt
1 cup sugar
3 cups milk
3 cups stoned cherries
1/4 t. grated lemon rind
1 cup thick cream.

Cook the rice, salt, sugar and milk in a double boiler until all milk is absorbed. Cool, then add cherries, chopped, grated lemon rind and beaten cream. Freeze in refrigerator tray.

Steamed Cherry Pudding.

1 lb. cherries
1/4 cup sugar
1-3 cups flour
Few grains salt
2 t. baking powder
1/4 cup milk
2 eggs
2 T. melted shortening.

Stone cherries and place them in a greased pudding mold and sprinkle the sugar over them. Sift dry ingredients of pudding together, add well beaten eggs with milk and melted shortening and beat until quite smooth. Pour over cherries, cover with waxed paper and steam 1 1/2 hours. Invert into a hot bowl and serve with creamy sauce.
