that the auto is vital in his occupation. Autolists of financial means who have been hesitant about the purchase of a license, and unlicensed autos, used by young folks for pleasure trips will be held to a strict accounting.

In the same drive, California licensed cars belonging to Oregonians and employed in Oregon, or voting in Oregon, will be directed to procure a 1932-1933 Oregon license or store their car.

LOMSKI PROMISES M'CARTHY LACING

Up to noon today 25 applications for auto licenses had been secured from the sheriff's office. Governor Meier's moratorium for motors expires Sunday at midnight, so tomorrow is the final day for procurement.

Many motorists expect to wait until later so they may come under the part-year provisions.

Reports from California Thursday said that, despite recognition of the governor's moratorium, in Modoc and Lassen counties Oregonians with old license plates were still being forced to buy California licenses on the theory that if Oregonians had funds to travel they had funds for new licenses. Oregon autolists were detained Wednesday in Butte Valley, Siskiyou county, and given the choice of purchasing a California license or leaving their machines in a garage. The California license is void in their home state which adds to the confusion.

While no official word has come from Salem, it is understood from reliable sources that enforcement of the license laws will be left to the discretion of the commanding officers of the state police in the various districts.

This means that if an autolist needs his car for work, he will be granted leniency for a certain period, but if the car is used for pleasure trips he will be directed to make a license purchase.

In every instance the car owner will have to show conclusive proof that he is in financial straits and

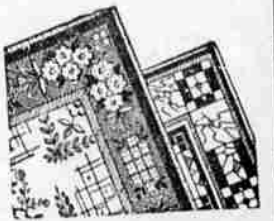

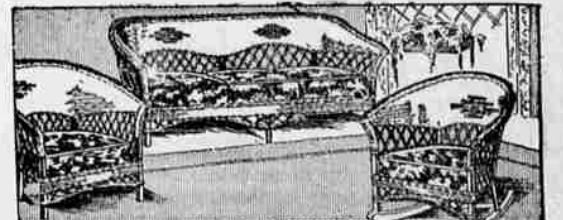
