Scoring was fairly even up to the seventh inning, when Talent brought in the last three runs of the game. Few errors marred the playing, and interest ran high through the eighth inning, when the Pelicans filled the bases with one out, only to have Cook, veteran hurler for Talent, fan the next two men up, putting the game pretty well on ice. F. E. Samson's free feed show held last Saturday attracted a large number of Rogue River valley dairymen and poultry raisers who were especially interested in the clinic feature and discussion of treatment of alling chickens.

Jim Howarth, head of the feed department of the Sperry feed mill in Portland, supervised the clinic, posting several defective birds as an example.

At 11 o'clock carrier pigeons were sent from Medford to Portland by the Sperry company, and prizes were awarded to the persons guessing the approximate time for the flight. Following stops for lunch the pigeons landed in the northern city in eight hours and six minutes. Mr. Samson expects to conduct a similar event on a larger scale in the future, since so much interest was evidenced in Saturday's show.

FRUIT WORKERS GIVEN RIDE HINT

In view of the existing auto license difficulty and the approach of the fruit harvest, Carl Y. Tengwald offered a suggestion today, aimed to aid workmen sans licenses in getting to work.

Last year at his orchard, Mr. Tengwald said there were 30 pickers hired. They came to work in 22 cars. As the wages offered pickers this year, it would be highly impractical if the men had licenses for their autos, for them to use that many cars for transportation. So Mr. Tengwald suggested that one man transport six workmen to the orchard, collect a small fee from each and enable all to arrive on the job at less expense. In each crew, he pointed out these are probably several workmen who could not afford to operate cars with this amount of help.
