AUTO. RECEIPTS WILL INDICATE RELIEF AMOUNT Jackson county will know nothing definite relative to the apportionment of state and federal funds for road and other relief work, until the final figures are available on the auto license receipts and a close study of the federal unemployment relief bill had been made.

The district attorney's office has been requested to give an opinion on the powers of the county to make a loan for road relief work under the reconstruction bureau. This will be done as soon as the copies of the unemployment relief bill are received. Jackson county will also receive money from the auto license funds. The first out from this source is used as sinking fund for interest on bonds, and the remainder is directed to the road fund for emergency relief work.

As soon as the preliminaries are cleared, the county court and other agencies will confer to determine the securing and use of funds from state and national sources.

The demonstration was in charge of Charles S. Garvin, division supervisor of the Shell stations. Representatives were in attendance at both meetings from Ashland, Grants Pass, Klamath Falls and Bend. Monday, talks were given by George M. Graham, district supervisor, with headquarters here; W. G. Rich, district manager from Eugene; S. S. Stanton, assistant district manager in charge of lubrication, also of Eugene; Mr. Garvin; G. J. Jones, Klamath Falls; R. E. Jones, Medford; and Wesley Crooks, Grants Pass. The three latter named are local managers in those territories.

At the meeting several new policies being adopted by the company were announced, and Mr. Graham emphasized the fact that all of the Shell stations will include the new complete lubrication system as an additional feature for their patrons.

TAKE SQUATTERS FROM FISH CREEK DESERT REGION PORTLAND, AUG. 3.—(AP)—Two deputy United States marshals, Loren Cochran and Roy B. Knox, were expected here today with seven men who are said to have illegally taken up homesteads in the Fish Creek desert in southern Oregon, in defiance of repeated declarations of the government that such action would be dealt with harshly.

The office of the government attorney said E. H. Best and Emory Davis, whose battle for the right to homestead the land has several times landed them in jail, are included in the group recently discovered there. Federal officers here said the seven men were secretly indicted by the last federal grand jury.

Investigation of homesteading on the government land in the Fish Creek burn was conducted by Benjamin R. Burdge, agent of the department of justice, from his headquarters at Diamond Lake.
