

# Carr-Eastman Track Duel Main Feature of Day's Olympic Program

## 400 METER ACES IN THIRD EPISODE OF TRACK RIVALRY

### Finns in Last Ditch Fight To Salvage Portion of Foot Racing Laurels — Record Breaking Goes On

 LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Finland's last-ditch fight to save at least one bright jewel out of the wreckage of its Olympic foot-racing crown today shared the spotlight with the third episode of the rivalry between Bill Carr and Ben Eastman, American 400-meter aces, with no slackening of the track and field record-breaking carnival in sight.

For five days the "build-up" for today's two track climaxes has sounded just like the old family phonograph — one record after another. Thousands who have been watching the astounding Olympic spectacle from the outset now mingle laughter with their cheers to greet the announcer's old refrain: "Creating a new Olympic and world record."

Anyone who had fortitude to keep track of it all can emerge with the statistical gem that 45 record performances have been announced in 17 track and field events for men and women.

The response yesterday could have been heard in four different languages as Luigi Beccali won the classic Olympic 1500 meters in the Olympic record time of 3:51.2, for Italy's first Olympic foot-racing victory of all time; as Matti Jarvinen led the first successful Finnish thrust with an Olympic javelin throw of 228 feet 7 inches; as Chuhei Nambu of Japan, the world record broad jumper, added the hop, step and jump championship and world crown to his credit, with a mark of 31 feet 7 inches; and, finally, as America's own Mildred Babe Didrikson scampered to her second world record victory in the 80-meter hurdles, in 11.7 seconds.

Look to Lehtinen. Finland's first championship, however, in an event which was here simply for going through the motions of spear-throwing, won't be enough to offset her cup of bitterness, if youthful Lauri Lehtinen fails today to take the 5000 meters, the last flat race title that the Finns have a chance to salvage.

This Olympiad so far has dealt a stunning series of blows to the foot-racing prestige that Finland developed so sensationally after the war. First and bitterest blow of all was the banishment of Paavo Nurmi, the king of her runners, on the very eve of the games, destroying Finland's best chances to win the 10,000 meters and marathon. Then came the youthful Ivo Hollo's defeat Sunday by the Polish star, Jan Kusocinski, in the 10,000. Yesterday the 1500-meter crown passed for the first time to an Italian, while Finland's defending champion, Harry Larva, finished in the ruck along with his two compatriots, Purjo and Luomann.

Klamath Boy Feared. With Nurmi and Willie Ritola no longer there to carry on, Finland's 800-meter hopes rested squarely upon young Lehtinen, best of the country's newcomers and a world record breaker at the distance. The man they feared most, for the first time, was an American, Ralph Hill of Oregon, still holder of the national outdoor mile record. Hill has now developed sensationally at the longer distance. He has a real "kick" and there is still the bright picture of how he ran away from Lehtinen in the 5,000-meter trials Tuesday, even though nothing but qualifying pieces were at stake.

Yet to be run, of course, are the 800-meter steeplechase and marathon, but in these events, too, the opposition for the Finns is stronger than ever, encouraged no doubt by the growing conviction that the cloak of Finnish invincibility has been removed.

Carr-Eastman In Duel. Meanwhile the Americans had their own private war to settle, between Eastman and Carr, each with a weather eye out meanwhile from the slim Englishman, Lieutenant Godfrey Lionel Rampling, built very much along the lines of the spindly-legged Scotchman, Eric Lidell, who won the Olympic 400-meter championship in 1924 while the bargipeses skried.

Rampling didn't look so impressive in the trials yesterday, even under wraps, and there has been nothing yet to prove he can touch the record-breaking performances of Carr and Eastman.

## PIRATES CROWDED BY FOUR OUTFITS AS SLUMP COMES

 The first serious slump the Pittsburgh Pirates have experienced since the middle of May has turned the National league pennant race into a dog fight today with four clubs close enough to the Corsairs to be dangerous.

Three home runs by Frank (Lefty) O'Doul beat the Pirates and stretched their losing streak to six games. The first, with two on, decided the first game in Brooklyn's favor, 7 to 4.
