## Oregonian Gives News Notes Of Cornish Players

An item of interest to the little group of medford people who attended the staging in Ashland of "Love and Chance" by the Cornish players recently appeared in the Oregonian.

It reads: "What is hailed as one of the most unusual theatrical tours of the current year in the west passed through Portland this week."

"It passed through because there was no suitable theater or hall in which to present 'Love and Chance,' the old French play of Marivaux, with which the company had just concluded an 8000-mile road tour of western states, without once hearing" as Miss Nellie Cornish, director of the school, reported, "a word about the depression."

"It is the first tour sent out by the Cornish school of Seattle under the endowment made last season by Dorothy Whitely Elmhurst, whose backing in England made the production of 'Journey's End' possible."

"The work of the Cornish school so interested Mrs. Elmhurst in 1930, when her daughter, a student in the school, took a company of eight Cornish students east with her, that she endowed 11 scholarships. This makes it possible to hold together a permanent company of students trained in the school for road tours."

"In the group of 12 in the 'Love and Chance' company, four are Oregonians: Arthur De Huff and Kinert Wolf of Portland, Ford Rainey of Astoria and Dorothy Vera; Mrs. Fred Sandt and granddaughter, Carl Lee; Mrs. Bruce Powell and daughter, Patty Lou; Mrs. Elmer Capp, Mrs. Victor Bursell and Mrs. J. Sanford Richardson and daughter, Doris."
