

REPUBLICANS MAP EASTERN SUPPORT ON LIQUOR STAND

Vigorous Campaign Against Democratic Repeal Plank Will Be Waged—Hoover's Speech Is Satisfactory

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Republicans today mapped out a vigorous eastern campaign in support of their prohibition submission plank against the Democratic repeal.

The tentative program called for a speech by President Hoover in Franklin D. Roosevelt's own state of New York and another in New England, possibly Boston.

Victory in the entire strategic section was predicted by G. O. P. leaders as they scanned the acceptance speech Mr. Hoover will make tomorrow night. To Senator Hebert of Rhode Island, an opponent of prohibition and eastern campaign manager for the Republicans, President Hoover's much-awaited reference to that speech to prohibition is "satisfactory."

Hebert asked that the reference would "back the Republican re-submission plank."

The tentative plans for the president's eastern speeches, probably after mid-September, mean, said Republican campaign managers, that they intend an aggressive drive in the region from which Democrats hoped their pledge for repeal would draw many votes.

Hebert will be in direct charge of the eastern area. Helping him will be John Q. Tilson of Connecticut, former house Republican leader, and Jeremiah Milbank of New Jersey. Tilson will handle speakers and Milbank money.

The president expected further reports on the campaign's general progress from Everett Sanders, chairman of the Republican national committee, who will be here for notification ceremonies tomorrow night.

HAY FEVER CURE FOR COOLIDGE IS AIM OF EXPERTS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Sympathetic over word that Calvin Coolidge suffers from hay fever, government experts were wondering today whether the former president had taken advantage of the many serums regarded as cures for the disease.

The first step to be taken in Mr. Coolidge's case, students of hay fever point out, would be to determine, if possible, the particular pollen which affects him.

This is comparatively easy, they say. Mr. Coolidge might be susceptible to the pollen from common ragweed. A serum made with the pollen of the plant would be used. If numerous injections did not ward off attacks, more serum would be called for until common ragweed could be approached without apprehension.

Giant ragweed causes the trouble for many. If so, a serum from giant ragweed. Or it might be a plant of the cocklebur family. A cocklebur serum would be needed and so on down the list.

Some persons are sensitive to any number of pollen bearing plants, or even to feather, horse hair and carpets.

It is estimated that 85 per cent of hay fever sufferers in the east do their sneezing through one of the two common varieties of ragweed.

If Mr. Coolidge should be one of the majority, he would arrive in Washington Thursday for President Hoover's notification and depart—If he left the next day—just before the rag weed in Washington and vicinity begins to scatter its pollen profusely.

WASCO GROWERS WILL HOLD TRAIN

THE DALLES, Ore., Aug. 10.—(AP)—A movement to withhold all local grain from the market until the price has advanced to at least 15 cents a bushel above the present level, was inaugurated here Tuesday by the Wasco Wheat Growers' association. The plan is in line with the "seller's strike" recently instituted in the midwest.

Warehouses here say they already have received more than 50,000 bushels of new crop wheat. The association said banks are encouraging the holding policy by not calling on ranchers to sell to meet current obligations.

BERLIN, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler, head of the powerful national socialist party, loomed more prominently than ever today as President von Hindenburg's choice for chancellor of Germany.
