

MRS. NETTIE WEBB, PIONEER OF AREA, CALLED BY DEATH

Another pioneer of Jackson county, Mrs. Nettie L. Howard Webb, wife of B. S. Webb, of 1466 North Mansfield avenue, Hollywood, Cal., died at her home Monday evening, August 8, 1932, of heart disease. She was born in Kewanee, Ill., December 3, 1859, days of age at the time of her death.

She crossed the plains by ox team with her parents, J. A. and M. B. Howard, and two brothers in 1860, and arrived in Jacksonville in October of the same year.

She grew to womanhood in Jacksonville, where she lived until 1884, when the family moved to the new town of Medford. She was well known to the older pioneers of the valley.

November 10, 1886, she was married to B. S. Webb of Medford, later moving to Hollywood, Cal. She was an early member of the Christian church of Medford, her husband being a charter member. After going to Hollywood she became a member of the Christian church there, and was active in church work until her health failed her in recent years.

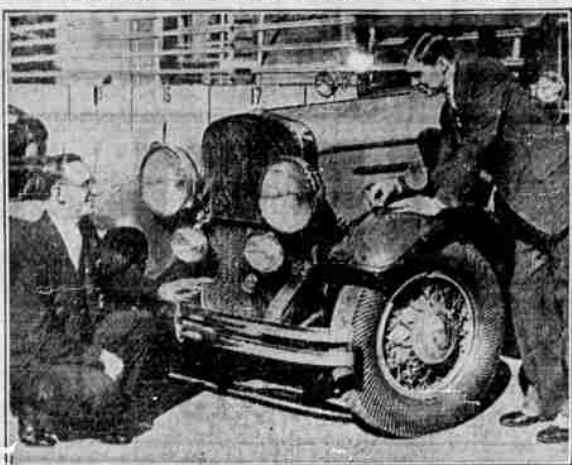

Rin Tin Tin of Movies Goes to Dog Paradise

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The famous German police dog actor, Rin Tin Tin, which was credited with saving Warner Brothers from possible bankruptcy before that movie concern gave the world talking pictures, is dead after more than 13 years in the films.

Popular the world over among movie goers, the clever animal star, which earned a fortune in his career, died Tuesday morning at the home of his owner and trainer, Lee Duncan, in nearby Westwoodan it became known last night.

Death apparently resulted from the infirmities of age. Rin Tin Tin was 14 years old, quite aged for a dog.

He will be succeeded in pictures by his son, Rin Tin Tin, Jr., and the latter will start in a few days on a picture which was to have starred the elder dog. Mascot pictures announced.

Rin Tin Tin was in several pic-

tures for Warners in the silent film days. His popularity is credited, in large measure, with having bridged Warners over serious financial difficulties, which befell them just before they bought Vitaphone and gave the world its first talking picture.

No estimate was available on the life-time earnings of the remarkable canine thespian, but the total is believed to have been around \$300,000.

He has appeared on the stage, and his bark has been heard by radio in programs advertising a dog food.

The body was buried privately at the rear of the Duncan home.

A statement from Mascot pictures said Rin Tin Tin, Jr., which has been trained for a year for picture work, gives promise of equalling if not excelling the elder dog as an actor.

Republicans Wait Key Address by President

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Republican hosts rallied around President Hoover today to heed his call to arms for the 1932 campaign.

The vexing prohibition problem and moves, past and contemplated, to meet the economic situation form the substance of the keynote address Mr. Hoover will deliver tonight in formally opening his drive for another four years in office.

Republican leaders from coast to coast are assembled here for the traditional notification ceremony, and each has brought a message of renewed hope to the president, born of the recent upturn in commodity prices.

Waiting to hear the last word from the party chieftains, Mr. Hoover only today completed the final test of his speech of acceptance. He has consulted, apparently, over the ver-

biage of the prohibition declaration and some phases of a legislative program he has in mind for the short session of congress beginning in December.

A buffet luncheon on the south lawn of the White House to the Republican guests and presided over by Mr. and Mrs. Hoover was the start of the day's program. Tonight at about 9:15 o'clock, eastern standard time, the president will begin his address. It will be broadcast by two nation-wide chains and Republican meetings have been called throughout the nation to listen.

Everett Sanders of Indiana, as chairman of the Republican national committee, will preside over the session. Representative Snell, of New York, as permanent chairman of the Republican convention which nominated Mr. Hoover in June will deliver the brief message of notification.

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The stock market acted weary of bullish stimulation today, but it encountered the support of fresh buying on declines. The result was a mixture of gains and losses at the finish, mostly narrow. Turnover amounted to some 4,200,000 shares.

The market was given a sharp boost under leadership of rails and farm implements, but buying soon

dwindled, and the growing feeling that the list was ripe for a technical reaction brought considerable profit taking and short selling. Morning advances of 1 to 4 were replaced with losses of 1 to 3. Buying appeared on the setback, however, from both foreign and domestic sources, and many shares recovered.
