CRATER PARK GIVEN HELPFUL HINTS BY CARNEGIE PRESIDENT

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK. - (Sp.) - For years interested in general development of national parks, Dr. John C. Merriam, Washington, D. C., president of the Carnegie Institution, was a visitor this week, devoting time to plans whereby park visitors may gain greater appreciation of scenic values and geologic history of Crater Lake.

To make such appreciation possible, Dr. Merriam has given careful thought to the installation of exhibits and equipment in the Sinnott memorial observation station and museum on Victor Rock near the lodge.

In speaking of national parks, as a whole, Dr. Merriam set forth the American people are becoming more interested in scenic wonders so set aside for the sole enjoyment of the public. Through observation, he has learned visitors are not content with visits confined only to viewing scenery, but are anxious to gain complete knowledge of what they are viewing.

With that thought in mind, he has taken active interest in the installation of equipment whereby Crater Lake visitors, entirely through their own efforts and observations, are enabled to gain a complete story of the lake, resting in what was the caldera of an ancient volcano, active many thousands of years ago. Binoculars, trained on important rim views, have been in use for the past season, supplemented by a series of exhibit boxes containing interesting volcanic specimens. The museum is to include exhibits dealing with the past and present of Crater Lake.

Dr. Merriam carried on similar activities in Grand Canyon park and has spent considerable time and efforts in Yosemite park.

NATIONAL PARKS HAVE FEW FIRES

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK. - (Sp.) - Forest fires in national parks so far this season have been few and a remarkable minimum, reported J. D. Coffman, fire control expert of the park service when a visitor at Crater lake this week, making his annual inspection of fire prevention measures taken in the park. The largest fire reported was confined to an area of 65 acres and was located in the Hawall national park.

Following a visit to the fire lookout station, located on the summit of "The Watchman," first high point on the north-west rim of Crater lake, he regarded the structure as the best lookout house in the park system in view of its dual purpose of fire prevention and serving observation station for visitors. The station is located at an altitude of 8025 feet and to reach it, a walk of less than 15 minutes from the rim road up a trail trail is required. A revealing panorama of the lake and miles of surrounding territory is possible from this point.

Park Landscapes Work Is Pushed

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK. - (Sp.) - Adding to the attractiveness of the rim area of Crater lake, landscapers have been engaged the past summer planting native grasses and shrubs between the rim promenade and road. The landscaping begins a short distance west of the crater wall trail and is to extend to the lodge. As a further improvement, log guard rails along the rim are to be replaced this season with stone curbing.
