

NIPPON SWIMMERS HAVE WHIP HAND IN OLYMPIC TEST

American Supremacy Is 'Doped' for Eclipse in Final Events in Water—U. S. Mermaids Hold Lead

OLYMPIC SWIMMING STADIUM, LOS ANGELES, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Thrilling a near-capacity crowd of 10,000 persons with four graceful performances, Miss Dorothy Poynton, Hollywood girl, today won the women's high diving championship of the tenth Olympiad with a total point score of 40.25.

Miss Poynton provided the unexpected by defeating Miss Georgia Coleman, Los Angeles, winner of the Olympic springboard diving title. Miss Coleman finished second with 35.55 points.

Miss Poynton, Miss Coleman and Miss Marion Roper made it a third clean sweep for the United States in the Olympic diving competition for first, second and third places. Americans had previously taken the first three positions in the men's and women's springboard championship.

Miss Roper was awarded 35.22 points for her third place in the field of seven contestants.

Others scored as follows: Miss Ingeborg Bjorkquist, Sweden, 34.52. Miss Etsuko Kamakura, Japan, 31.35. Miss Ingrid Larsen, Denmark, 31.95. Miss Magdalene Epply, Austria, 30.75.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 12.—(AP)—The aquatic world was forewarned today that Japan plans to lend a distinct Oriental hue to the closing episodes of the tenth Olympiad swimming championships.

Fortified with three sturdy performers in each of the three remaining races on the program, these sons of Nippon held the upper hand over the remainder of the field, including Uncle Sam's best, and it was quite evident that unless an upset of the most profound order was in prospect, the team title was due to leave American hands.

May Take Lead Today. With the only men's final on today's program, and the United States holding a five-point team lead, there was strong possibility that Japan might assume first place before sundown.

Meanwhile, America's mermaid dominated. Eleanor Holm won the 100-meter backstroke crown yesterday from Bonnie Mealing, Australia, in 1 minute 19.4 seconds, 1.1 seconds slower than her own Olympic record set in the semi-finals. As a result, the feminine team lead mounted to 51 against 17 for Australia.

Hungary Polioists Unbeaten. Hungary's great water polo team maintained its undefeated record by trouncing the United States, 7 to 0. The Yankees had gone undefeated before, although Germany, 1928 champions, held them to a tie. The victory virtually assured Hungary the title.

Besides the 100-meter backstroke finals for men, Olympic titles to be decided today included the women's high platform diving, and the women's 400-meter relay, both of which United States was favored to win.

PORTLAND'S LEAD IS THREATENED BY ONCOMING STARS

(By the Associated Press) Hollywood's Stars battled themselves to within two games of the first-place Portland club Thursday night by hammering the Seattle Indians into submission, 12 to 5. Cleo Carlyle, center fielder, led the Hollywood attack, getting five hits in five times up. Jim Turner, Star hurler, contributed three of his team's 18 safeties, one of them a homer. The Indians got 13 hits, but were not as successful in turning them into scores.

Part of the Portland Beavers' lead slipped away from them as San Francisco won the third straight of the series, 4 to 2. Davis allowed the Ducks only six hits. The Seals were held to seven safeties, but bunched them more effectively. Art Garibaldi, second baseman, brought home three of the runs by timely hitting.

Bert Cole of the Missions and Lefty Vinci, Sacramento hurler, put on a beautiful nine-inning duel, with the Senators winning out in the final frame, 1 to 0. The winning run was made as a result of Cole's fumble of an easy fielding chance.

Los Angeles remained in third place, half a game behind Hollywood, by beating the Oaks 2 to 1 in a 13-inning contest.

ANZAC OARSMAN SLATED TO WIN OLYMPIC SCULL

LONG BEACH, Cal., Aug. 12.—(AP)—Apparently only the biggest kind of an upset could deprive Henry Robert (Bobby) Pearce, broad-shouldered Australian oarsman, from the distinction of being the first to capture the Olympic single sculling champion twice in succession.

Pearce's defense of his world title was the feature of today's program, calling for decisions in four of the seven divisions of the Olympic regatta.

The remaining finals, including the eight-oared race with California flying the American colors against Italy, Great Britain and Canada, will be rowed off tomorrow.

Pearce's chief opposition figured to come from Bill Miller of Philadelphia, the American champion. In a four man race including the giant Guillermo Douglas of Uruguay and Leslie (Dick) Sherwood of Great Britain. However, Pearce appeared to be "under wraps" when he took Miller's measure in the first sculling yesterday to beat Douglas and eliminate Joe Wright, Jr., of Canada in the final preliminary test.

EGAN, EVANS BACK IN OLD GOLF FEUD FOR WESTERN CUP

Pair Will Give Added Interest to Event Scheduled for Rockford, Ill., Country Club Opening August 22

(Associated Press Sports Writer) ROCKFORD, Ill., Aug. 12.—(AP)—Two old "war horses" of the fairways, H. Chandler Egan and Charles "Chick" Evans, will give the 1932 Western amateur golf championship a thrill when the white pellets start flying over the Rockford Country club course August 22.

These two veterans, who have won the western crown 12 times between them over the past 29 years, will battle for it again this year, pitting their recovered skill and experience against approximately 140 products of golf-dom's younger generation led by the defending champion, Don Moe of Portland, Ore.

Egan, now in his 48th year, but back on the strong game that brought him the western title in 1902, '04, '05 and '07 and the National amateur championship in 1904 and '05 isn't regarded as a set-up by any means by his youthful rivals.

The veteran of a thousand matches as he called his first comeback in 1929 by sweeping to the semi-finals of the National and recaptured the Pacific northwest crown this year.

Evans, golf's most notorious victim of missed putts, is far from the shortmaker that swept to western titles eight times between 1909 and '23, but word has spread that he has been playing his best golf in five years.

Boys Also Good But the "old timers" will have a struggle on their hands from the qualifying round of 35 holes to the final championship putt.

Moe will be back and so will the 1930 champion, Johnny Lehman of Chicago; Charlie Seavers, Los Angeles star; Jack Westland, Chicago, finalist in the 1931 National amateur, and possibly Harrison "Jimmy" Johnston, another national champion of yesterday, from St. Paul.

Walker Cup Conflict Because of the fact that the Walker Cup matches, are slated for Brookline, Mass., beginning September 1, many other stars, including the English team members, will be missing from the tournament picture. However, several western stars may come in as late entries.

For the "straight and narrow" shot-makers, the championship Rockford course doesn't hold any terrors. It isn't so very long and the greens are fair. It is well trapped, the fairways are laid out to penalize bad shots and three holes border a river. Par is 71.
