Craterian Film

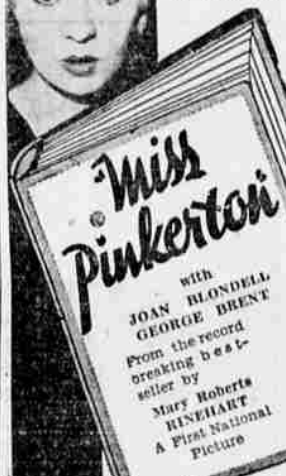
