Of interest to Daughters of the American Revolution are the proposed changes to be made in the national committee. At the first meeting of the new national board, the new president-general, Mrs. Magna, recommended that the committee on legislation in the United States congress be recreated; that the name of the historical and literary reciprocity committee be changed to committee for filling and lending historical papers; that the national defense committee be called the national defense embodying patriotic education; that the present patriotic education committee hereafter be known as the Americanism and approved schools committee and that a national registrars committee be created. This committee is to consist of all state registrars with the registrar-general as chairman. All of these recommendations were approved by the board, to be considered later by the state societies.

Crater Lake chapter committees have been busy during the summer, planning the program and outlining activities for the year and the opening autumn meeting will be held on September 17th.

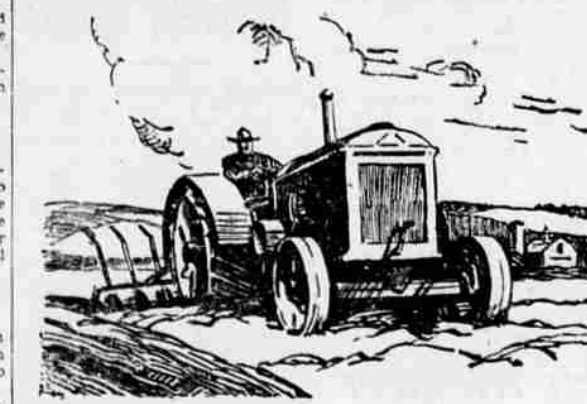
## LE FEVRE MOVING TO MURRAY BEAUTY SHOP
