

# JAPANESE SWIM TO VICTORY O'ER STARS OF WORLD

## First Team Title in History of Olympics Is Taken by Sturdy Little Brown Men As Big Crowd Cheers

By PAUL ZIMMERMAN, (Associated Press Sports Writer) OLYMPIC SWIMMING STADIUM, LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 13.—(AP)—Japan closed the greatest water carnival ever known to the modern Olympic games today in the blaze of two glorious victories which gave Nippon its first team title.

The youngest and the oldest members of the sturdy team from across the Pacific turned the trick as the capacity cosmopolitan crowd of 12,000 persons extended the victorious little brown men prolonged cheers.

Sawyer is familiar to local fight fans, having appeared on Mack Lillard's card here June 18 against Leo Lonski, the "Sweden Assassin." 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# GOLDEN BEARS ROW TO TITLE IN HOT FINISH

MARINE STADIUM, LONG BEACH, Cal., Aug. 13.—(AP)—In a heart-rending finish that left a vast crowd of 60,000 spectators gasping with excitement, the University of California's unbeaten crew came from behind with a closing surge to whip Italy's powerful boat load today by just 15 inches, one-fifth of a second, and win the crowning event of the Olympic regatta for the United States.

Facing defeat with barely 100 meters to go, the American collegians responded with a remarkable closing spurt that was just enough to send the prow of their boat first across the finish line.

The official times were 6 minutes, 37 3-5 seconds for the United States, 6:37 4-5 for Italy.

Finest unified in the terrific din of excitement, even though they were close enough to make it a "blanket" finish, California's leaders and the Cambridge University crew of Great Britain finished third and fourth in a battle that was almost as sensational as that between the first two boats.

Keeping their own unbeaten record for 1932 intact, thereby duplicating the triumph of their California predecessors in 1928, and likewise maintaining the unbroken string of American triumphs in Olympic eight-oared competition, the great Golden Bear boat load also clinched the Olympic rowing championship for the United States with the winning total of 38 points for the regatta.

Great Britain, with two championships won, finished second with 36 points. Germany third with 20 and Italy fourth with 17.

# HOOVER HURRIES CONFERENCE OF BUSINESS HEADS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Spurring plans for a national conference of business leaders at the White House, President Hoover today turned his back upon the purely political affairs that have occupied him for much of the last week.

The chief executive called in Roy D. Chapin, recently recruited from the automobile industry for the secretary of commerce post, for a lengthy conference on plans for the economic parity aimed at a co-ordination of the forces of government and business.

Chapin was reticent about detailed plans for the conference, the exact date for which will be announced by Mr. Hoover Monday.

"I can only say," Chapin added, "that the president has a very definite and very fine plan, speaking as a business man, and I think the business men of the country are going to like it."

# RUSTLERS' FATE AWAITS RETURN OF COUNSELLOR

Deferment of final decision in the cases of Victor Goble, Ora Goble, and Kitch Pettie, Trail youths, charged with larceny of stock from the range was ordered Saturday morning by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, until such time as Attorney Charles W. Reames, counsel for the Goble brothers, returns from his annual vacation.

Attorney Reames is expected to return the coming week. As further reason for delay, the court will occupy the Douglas county bench at Roseburg in hearing a case most of the present week.

The case of Ora Goble, 17, a minor, was ordered transferred to the juvenile court.

Attorney Harry Skyrman informed the court that Attorney Reames would return to the city Wednesday. Attorney Don Newbury, counsel for Pettie agreed to the postponement.

The court stated from the bench, "that this is a case of considerable seriousness, both to the public, and the defendants," and "warned the parents and friends of the accused to try not to talk to court about it."

The court declared "both sides would have a chance in open court to make statements."

The courtroom was comfortably filled with friends and relatives of the three defendants, and the usual curious spectators.

Pettie and the Goble brothers, following their arrest last week, made detailed statements to the state police and sheriff's office, confessing the theft, slaughter, and sale of the stock. Tyrus Beck, 19, of this city, will enter a plea of not guilty, and his case will come to the attention of the next grand jury session. The stolen stock belonged to Arthur Kent, Vern Brophy, and P. E. Bybee, stockmen of the Trail and Antelope districts.
