NEW YORK, Aug. 16. (AP)—In the face of successive waves of selling the stock market forged ahead today, pushing a number of issues, particularly rails, above the peak levels of the summer recovery reached last week.

An excited flurry of short covering in which shares were traded in blocks of 1000 to 10,000 shares, gave the list a boost of \$1 to \$7 a share in the morning. This upturn was about half lost in a slow decline in the afternoon, only to be partly restored in a last minute upturn.

Sales approximated 3,700,000 shares. The cotton market rose nearly \$1 a bale to new highs for the recovery, but lost part of its rise, closing with net gains of 30 to 50 cents.
