

WINTER GARDENS ADDED TO RELIEF PLANS OF WOMEN

Winter garden plans are the latest addition to the food conservation program, moving rapidly forward in Jackson county under the leadership of the women's division of the County Unemployment Relief council, according to announcement today. Mrs. Donald Clark, chairman of food conservation in Medford, and Mrs. Sam McNair, chairman of the Ashland Women's division, both appointed by Mrs. A. E. Reames, are making great progress toward providing food for the jobless. Information on winter gardening was gleaned yesterday from R. G. Fowler, county agent.

Planting of fall and winter vegetables is encouraged by Mr. Fowler as a great aid to solving of the food problem. Head lettuce, which provides the much needed vitamins, he recommended as a good fall vegetable requiring less than three months growth from seed to harvest. It does best when planted in August or early September. The best variety, Mr. Fowler named as "New York No. 12."

Spinach, he stated, is also a crop that lends itself to southern Oregon conditions. It should be planted in August or early September and "improved Thick Leaf" and "King of Denmark" are the best varieties for production here.

Carrots and beets, which should have been planted a little earlier in the season for best results, can still be grown, where there is water, Mr. Fowler said. If planted right away, "The Chantenois," he recommended as best variety.

Radishes can be sown here as late as October 15. "Scarlet Turnip" is the most popular radish. Turnips provide a fine winter food and can be sown, broadcast, or in rows until as late as October 1. Mr. Fowler advised the planting of "Golden Harvest."

FULLERTON, Neb.—(AP)—A fad for "booster" clubs has swept through Nebraska towns this summer—whisker clubs, big hat clubs, purple shirt and red necktie clubs—

But Fullerton, to be different, organized a barefoot club.

And the business men of this town of 2700 population have taken it seriously, though hot sidewalks blister the feet.

About 200 of the town's merchants joined the club and pledged themselves to go barefooted until Nance county's homecoming celebration. Allowance was made, however for

members with tender feet—they were permitted to wear soles bound to bare feet.

Rules permit shoes to be worn in places of business, but when a member appears on the street with shoes on he's taken before a "kangaroo court" by a "constable."

Even traveling men reaching Fullerton have been taken into "court" and fined, or required to remove their shoes.

Not to be outdone by the men, Fullerton women organized an "auxiliary"—a "pinafore club, whose members are required to wear pinafores and hair ribbons.

LABOR CONTRACTS WILL BE SOLD TO AID UNEMPLOYED

At a meeting of the Central Civic Council, held at the Chamber of Commerce last night, definite plans were formulated for the sale of labor agreements to finance the operations of the Medford Association of the Unemployed, looking toward the accumulation of materials for the use of the unemployed during the coming winter, according to Larry Schade, president of the council.

Solicitation for sale of the association labor agreements will be made by the unemployed themselves, and H. G. Moore, manager of the association, is today completing arrangements for the selection of committees to do the actual contact work. It is expected that a major part of the work will be completed by Saturday night.

It was pointed out at last night's meeting that it was the object of the Association of the Unemployed to sell the association labor agreements particularly to those residents of the city who are now unemployed, and that no special effort will be made to sell the agreements to business houses or firms. The association hopes to gain the cooperation of those now having jobs in providing one day's work per month from each person employed in the city.

Undoubtedly the first project for which funds derived from the sale of labor agreements will be used is that of gathering a sufficient quantity of wood for the use of the unemployed families this winter.

Other projects will be worked out by the association of the unemployed, composed of heads of families living in and near Medford.
