

AMERICAN POLICY ON SOVIET TRADE DRAWS CRITICISM

Non-Recognition Reacts to Economic Disadvantage of Uncle Sam, Says Izvestia, Russ Government Organ

MOSCOW, Aug. 17.—(AP)—The United States' policy of refusing to recognize Soviet Russia was roundly criticized today in a lengthy article in Izvestia, the government organ.

Non-recognition, the article said, not only reacts to America's economic disadvantage but also increases the danger of a world conflict.

Party Action Irks P. Lapiknaky, writer of the attack, was vague and obscure about the conditions that the possibility of the world conflict was increased, but his article reflected the official disapproval here that both the major political parties of the United States ignored the recognition openly and clearly, and the general content surrounding it also not only an insurmountable barrier to normal relations but also the instability of United States policy, the article said.

"The main source of this policy lies in the fact its political regime is old and decomposed. One of the elements in the great reduction of the United States trade balance is the decrease in American export to the U. S. S. R."

Policy Stopped "Only children could contend that recovery from the depression is possible without participation by one-sixth of the globe. A policy ignoring this fact shows lack of vitality. When the U. S. S. R. is a participant in the Kellogg pact, when it takes part in international conferences with the United States and when the U. S. S. R. has various economic relations with the United States, the question of recognition becomes one of lifeless byzantine etiquette and contemporary life sooner or later will mock at this etiquette." The article is the first on the subject in some time. It indicated the growing hope here that the depression may bring a change in the American policy.

WANDERER TAKES RANCHER'S HORSE PHEASANT CHICKS STEP OUT TODAY

Byron Petersen, a wanderer from Texas, was arrested by the state police early this morning, and is held in the county jail, charged with the theft of a horse belonging to Bart Chapman, a rancher of the district south of Ashland.

According to the state police, Chapman said he stole the horse to "get in jail," and readily admitted the crime.

The horse is about 10 years old, and is used by Chapman as a cow horse and for farm work. The animal is an important cog in his means of livelihood, and cannot conduct his small farm and stock business without it.

Petersen was arrested on the south slope of the Siskiyou, and according to the state police, welcomed arrest. The horse, with saddle and bridle, was stolen Tuesday afternoon. Petersen rode the horse until dark, and was traced down trails and through the woods of the Emigrant creek district. When night came the trail was lost, but picked up at dawn this morning and Petersen apprehended.

The state police report that Petersen cut the wire fence, and stole the horse, riding the animal back through the pasture once.

The county court has the suspicion that the seeker of aid has money, and is investigating the case further.

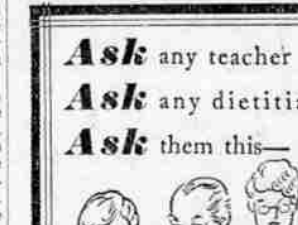

That the frank reduction or complete cancellation of European war debt would bring large dividends in the form of international good will and improved economic conditions was the opinion of Victor P. Morris, professor of economics at the University of Oregon, in his address before the Rotary club Tuesday noon.

There is no denying the fact," said Dr. Morris, "that complete all-around cancellation of debts and reparation charges would throw an added burden on the American taxpayer but this added charge might be regarded as a delayed contribution from America to the expense of the great war and would be inconceivable as compared with the total cost. Further reduction of debt obligations owing to America is supported by the decline of prices and the increase of purchasing power of the medium in which debt obligations are expressed.

The most compelling reason for cancellation, Dr. Morris found in the undesirable attitude which continuing debts would breed among the people of Europe. The debt payments attended by almost impossible economic difficulties has been one of the chief reasons for growing antagonism toward America.
