

TWO TRANSIENTS WITH SMALLPOX ARE QUARANTINED

Two transient indigents—one from Idaho and the other from Utah—are under quarantine for smallpox in a North Front street house and, according to Dr. C. I. Drummond, county health officer, are in illegal possession of local labor cards. They arrived here by auto August 3 and two days later obtained labor cards, reputedly signed by two county tax-payers as required by law. One gave his residence as Jacksonville and the other as this city.

The county is providing food and medicine. One of the quarantined men has a wife and four children whom the authorities said, he intended to bring here as soon as possible. They planned to obtain work in the fruit.

County Commissioner Victor Bursell said this morning that all local labor cards obtained by misrepresentation would be revoked as fast as found. The unemployment bureau and state police are now checking up on a number of cases. People formerly registered for local cards as fast as they came, as it was impossible to determine their actual residence.

It is suspected that transients have thus imposed upon local labor and an earnest effort will be made to correct the situation, it is stated. It is known that a number of Californians have local labor cards on the claim of long residence.

County authorities believe that word has been passed along the highways of the northwest, that Jackson county is "a soft spot," causing a mild influx of indigents.

Klamath county this week adopted a policy of "one meal for transients before departing and work for that." Update counties are also reported as "hard" and unsympathetic to "auto transients." The county court, in justice to its own people, will do the same thing at an early date, it is declared.

BARNUM'S CLAIM DENIED BY WIFE

Mrs. Helen V. Barnum yesterday, through her attorney, Charles W. Keames, filed opposition to her husband's plea for a reduction of costs in the recent divorce hearing. She asks for \$170 additional cost money and the right to funds for an appeal to the state supreme court, in the event that one should be decided upon. The defense sought a drastic cut in the bill for witness fees and other trial costs.

Mrs. Barnum sets forth in her objection that all witnesses called were necessary in her case, and denies the defense charge of "listening at the courtroom door." The document further alleges that a "friend of the defendant threatened bodily harm to plaintiff's attorney" during the progress of the trial.

Circuit Judge H. D. Norton still has a decision under advisement in the divorce suit, in which Mrs. Barnum seeks \$25,000 alimony, division of property, and custody of the minor child.

RUSTLERS' FACE SENTENCE SOON

Disposition of the cases of Oris and Victor Goble, brothers, and Kerch Pelle, Trail youths, who last week entered pleas of guilty to the theft and slaughter and sale of stock, will probably appear before Circuit Judge H. D. Norton tomorrow or Monday. The case of the younger Goble has been remanded to the juvenile court, as he is only 17 years of age. Tyrus Beck of this city, also accused, has entered a plea of not guilty, and his case has been remanded to the grand jury.

Friends of the youths say this is the first entanglement with the law, and that heretofore they have been steady and reliable young men.

According to the state police, three made detailed confessions of their activities. Vern Brophy, F. E. Bybee and Arthur Kent are listed as stockmen who had stock stolen.

COLLEGE ON WHEELS VISITS CRATER LAKE

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore.—(Special.) Representative of 32 states and having an enrollment of 245 members, the Omnibus college, a university of wheels, on a tour of national parks, visited Crater Lake this week to make geological studies of the lake area. The tour is sponsored by the Southwestern College of Kansas.

Six large passenger buses, the cafeteria trucks and several equipment trucks are included in the equipment of the "rolling college" to provide rapid and comfortable transportation. Students, making the seven weeks study tour, will receive credits at their respective colleges upon the completion of the journey.

PROF. PICCARD TO MAKE ASCENT IN NORTH POLE AREA

Instruments, he refused to say more than that he had reached a height of nearly 55,000 feet and encountered temperatures which were 8 degrees below zero Fahrenheit inside the spherical aluminum gondola and 67 degrees below on the outside.

The instruments, as well as the gondola itself, were taken last night from Cavallaro Di Monzanraro, where he landed, to the Italian aviation school here. Prof. Piccard said they had not been harmed by the jar when the gondola hit the ground, although the gondola itself was dented a little by the impact.

Undoubtedly, he said, they would reveal very interesting information, especially on the effect of cosmic rays that far above the earth's surface, the study of which was the principal reason he braved the stratosphere a second time.

Science First

From the minute he crawled out of the gondola yesterday, shaky after the sudden drop from below zero temperatures to sizzling heat, the professor was all the calm scientist. All his movements have been cool and methodical.

Even so, with his companion, Max Coyns, he calmly sat down on the ground and ate a can of peaches after his landing while excitement buzzed in the crowds that gathered around him, so he calmly superintended the hauling of the balloon and instruments here last night.

He ate a commonplace supper at a little hotel and went to bed immediately.

It was almost nightfall when they left the spot where they landed. Their every move had been watched by crowds of peasants, to whom it was an extraordinary occurrence. They do not read newspapers and had no notion what the whole thing meant.

World Strange From Afar

They reached their greatest height. Prof. Piccard said, three hours after they took off yesterday morning from Dubendorf, Switzerland. From that vantage point of ten miles, the world was a strange looking place. Landmarks were indistinct and the maps were of little value.

Only the large lakes indicated where they were. He recognized Lake Garda, 18 miles northwest of Cavallaro Di Monzanraro, decided to land there, but it took two hours to bring the balloon down.

The balloon was recognized by many people in the larger towns and when he finally headed toward land scores of automobiles followed him.

Some of the instruments were knocked off their bases when the balloon landed, he said, but apparently were not damaged. He said they functioned remarkably well in the extreme cold.

Says Like Rain

He and Max Coyns, his companion on the flight, slept for 11 hours last night and when they arose this morning there was a batch of congratulatory telegrams, among them one from the king and queen of the Belgians.

Prof. Piccard said Coyns did all the observation of cosmic rays during the flight, he himself giving all his attention to navigation of the balloon.

The rays, he said, increased in intensity as the altitude of the balloon increased, until "they were like rain on a tin roof."

He was too busy with navigation to observe his own sensations, but he recalled that the view from above the Alps was indescribably beautiful. From the gondola they could see the Tyrolean and Adriatic seas and the Italian lakes all at the same time. It was difficult to follow the map, he said, because the windows of the gondola are so small.

A great crowd outside the hotel cheered this morning until the aeronauts appeared on the balcony.
