## Indiana Jobless

**Aided By Gardens**

LAFAYETTE, Ind. — (AP) — Indiana has turned extensively to relief gardens to feed unemployed and part time employes, H. E. Young of Purdue university, has reported.

Fifty communities and 30 industries have projects. These include 7,500 industrial gardens of 1,000 acres, 21 community gardens of 784 acres, and 45,000 supervised home gardens of 6,000 acres.

## ALL EQUIPMENT IN COURT HOUSE IN COMING WEEK

Work of moving equipment to the new county courthouse is now under way, and will be in full swing early next week. It is expected that all the equipment will be in the new structure by the end of next week and arranged in ample time for the dedication exercises, September 1. The benches in the courtroom have been removed, and are now being varnished. They have been in use since the construction of the court house at Jacksonville, and are noted for their hard discomfort.

Work of moving the assessor's office files and desks started this morning. Most of the material not actually used in the transaction of county business has been hauled to the new quarters. The state police department will be the last office moved.

The county jail prisoners will not be moved to the jail on the roof, until the sheriff's office has been moved, which will be among the last.

The present equipment will be used and little new furniture has been ordered.

Painters will be through with their job early next week. The final coat of varnish is now being applied.
