CARVING PRAISED BY CONNOISSEURS

Employment for a number of the women of Medford who are in need of work has been made possible by the fact that the wonderful mother-of-pearl carving "The Lord's Last Supper" will be exhibited in Medford for another week.

Any unemployed woman who is interested is asked to meet Mr. John Korenlian, the owner of the carving, at 10 a. m., Monday on the mezzanine floor of the Medford Hotel and the liberal commission plan for the sale of tickets will be explained and territory allotted. All applicants should be of neat appearance and courteous bearing.

Nothing like this work of art has ever before been shown here, and Medford people are fortunate to have an opportunity to see this marvelous work which will be entered in the World's Fair at Chicago next year. The carving is 30x35 inches in size and over 170 years old, having been made in Jerusalem by a monk, who was 27 years at the task. The carving is considered to be valued at many thousands of dollars, although as in all art it can not be valued in dollars and cents.

This week only, Mr. Korenlian, owner of the masterpiece, will be on the mezzanine floor of the Hotel Medford each afternoon from 2:30 until 4 and from 7:30 until 9 each evening. He will tell the fascinating story of his making in many countries of the world in search of this art gem and of its loss and eventual recovery.

Along with the pear carving, he exhibits a remarkable desk and chair, inlaid with more than 95,000 separate pieces, which were once used in the harem of an Egyptian bey or prince, also a pearl inlaid Moroccan arm chair which was at one time used in the court of Abyssinia.

Another very beautiful article to be shown is a tall Damascus lamp made of hand hammered brass, cut in marvelous filigree pattern. The whole collection constitutes one of the most valuable and interesting exhibits ever to be shown in southern Oregon and it is hoped that every one in the city will take this opportunity to see these lovely things.
