HILL HALTS HERE ENROUTE TO K. F.

Ralph Hill, Olympic distance race star, arrived in this city Saturday afternoon by plane, at 2:40 o'clock, and will spend a couple of days visiting at the orchard home of Warren Patterson, three miles north of Central Point. Patterson is an old friend of Hill's father.

Hill after disembarking said that he "had one good night's sleep since he left for Chicago, and I slept less than an hour on the trip back.

The modest long distance racer, attributed his defeat in the Chicago events to "sprinting too soon, and laying back too long at the start. The others started fast, and I started slow.

"I was not in very good condition," Hill continued. "I was sleepy, and in Chicago fooled around too long, and ate my lunch late. By the time I got my affairs all straightened out for the trip home, it was time to go to the stadium."

Hill said on the return trip, he slept from Chicago to Cheyenne, with stops at Des Moines, Iowa, and Omaha, Neb. He is enthusiastic over plane travel.

The racer said he had an opportunity to tour Europe in September and "guess I will take it."

HOBSON TO COACH ASHLAND NORMAL

PORTLAND, Aug. 20—(AP)—Howard Hobson, who during his two years as athletic director at Benson Tech here, developed outstanding basketball and baseball teams, announced Friday that he has accepted the position of director of physical education and head athletic coach at Southern Oregon Normal at Ashland.

"I dealt with Southern Oregon Normal officials for two months and felt that their offer could no longer be refused," Hobson said.

Since graduating from University of Oregon in 1926 Hobson has built up a winning record as coach. He said he plans at Ashland to offer a fundamental background that will be preliminary to advanced training.

In addition to teaching Hobson will coach football, basketball and baseball. In his career he had coached 13 teams and nine have either won a championship or tied for that honor.
