Differences between Holman and Einzig over the state purchasing agent's activities came to a climax this week when Holman demanded Einzig's removal, submitting with his demand a series of statements made by clerks in his office charging Einzig with addressing Miss Ella Austin, secretary to Holman, in a "loud and coarse manner."

Unfair Methods Charged  
In Portland yesterday Holman supplemented his demand for removal with statements to newspapers that Einzig had received free medical treatment at one of the state hospitals, and that Oregon business men had complained to him of the unfair treatment to themselves in their efforts to transact business with the state.

Einzig was named secretary of the state board of control and state purchasing agent upon motion of Governor Meier more than a year ago to succeed Carl Abrams.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The bull movement in stock was accelerated for a time today by buoyancy of principal commodity markets, but it ran into considerable selling in the afternoon.  
Reduction of International Harvester's quarterly dividend of 30 cents from 45 cents was accepted as a signal to take profits, and gains which had ranged from \$1 to \$3 a share were sharply reduced.  
Several issues sold under last night's final prices for a time, but the market was bolstered by fresh buying late.  
Trading reached a volume reminiscent of the big markets of 1929. Turnover of around four and a half million shares made it one of the biggest days of the last two years.
