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CO-ORDINATION OF TOURIST EFFORTS NEED FOR COAST

Emphasizing the value of co-ordinating all tourist advertising issued by the various cities and organizations on the Pacific coast, Hon. Herbert Anacomb, former mayor of Victoria, and president of the Vancouver Island Tourist and Publicity bureau, addressed a meeting under the auspices of the tourist contact committee of the Medford Chamber of Commerce Tuesday evening.

"It is important," said Mr. Anacomb, "that cities on the Pacific coast recognize their inter-dependence, insofar as the attraction of tourists to their various communities is concerned, and individual advertising campaigns, designed to carry the message of recreational advantages should emphasize the all-year-round opportunities available on the Pacific Coast, from San Diego to Victoria."

Accompanying Mr. Anacomb was George I. Warren, president of the National Association of Tourist and Publicity Bureaus of Canada. A series of highly interesting and attractive stereopticon slides was shown to those attending the meeting by Mr. Warren, depicting scenes in and near the city of Victoria. The meeting was held in the Hotel Medford.

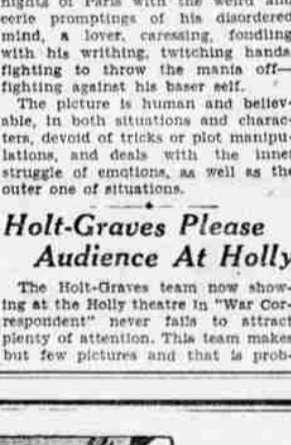

The three voiced today their appreciation of the generous contributions of the donors and other gifts and service, which have added much to the success of the clinic, described as the most modern and best equipped outside of Portland.

The committee is especially grateful to Harry Turner, courthouse contractor, for his interest and help, the members stated. Because of his affection for the late Judge Sparrow, made equipping of the clinic a pleasure.

The American flag, which draped the plaque, was presented as a permanent gift to the clinic by the local post of the American Legion. The inkwells and trays, which add to the utility and attractiveness of the clinic, were made by Mrs. Harold Jordan. The clever designs for the animal chairs were made by A. R. Livingston, who also made the illuminated plaque which marks the table, donated by the Central Point Grange.

"In loving memory of Alex Sparrow," Mr. Livingston also did the lettering on the memorial plaque.

All dental equipment in the clinic was donated by the Jackson County Public Health association. Scrap baskets, clothes hampers, the two mahogany chairs and all painted chairs are from the Medford Furniture and Hardware store. The Tile Tex flooring was obtained through the Big Pines Lumber company at cost. The examining tables, desks, children's animal chairs, shelves and measuring boards were made by Trowbridge's Cabinet Works; cretonne hangings, which add gaiety to the rooms, are from the Town and Country shop, and the gauze curtains from Mann's Department store. Pads and cushions, used in the clinic, are from Burks'.

The wrought iron gate was designed by L. J. Humphreys. Lee H. Hoffman, contractor, donated the benches in the waiting room. The two baby heads, which decorate the walls, are a gift from the Gerber company, which also sent 48 cans of strained vegetables to be used in the clinic. A lovely picture of mother and child was donated by the Pet Milk company. One baby scale was given by the clinic by the graduate nurses of this district, and another obtained by the Community hospital at cost. Glass jars were also obtained through the hospital.
