PICKING OF BOSCS HEAVY SAFES ARE BEGINS THIS WEEK MOVING PROBLEM IN HEAVY VOLUME FOR COURT HOUSE

Up to Friday night 389 cars of valley pears destined for eastern and export markets have been dispatched over the Southern Pacific. General picking of Boscs is scheduled to get underway this week, along with the close of the pick and pack of the second picking of Bartlett's and the Howell crop. On some of the lighter solid orchards, Boscs were picked the past week. The main crop is expected to be pouring into the packing houses by mid-week. The peak of the pear crop is expected to be reached by the week of September 5. The market was described as "improving" with prospects that by mid-September it would show "some rosiness." Warm weather is needed to ripen the tomato crop of the Rogue river valley according to Ralph Kooser, in charge of operations of the Bagley Canning company at Ashland. The pack was scheduled to start Friday, but was delayed owing to the slow ripening, due to chilly nights. Over 200 acres are under contract for the pack this season, and the cannery will employ 150 people while it is underway. At the Rogue River Valley Canning company in this city, operations have been retarded by both the pear and tomato crop coming at the same time. The local plant expects to can twice as many pears as originally planned. The pears have also been slow in ripening.
