The Little Fellow Pays the Bill!

For years the taxpayers, automobile owners and small truck owners have been carrying the load of our state highway program. Last year the state collected \$5,548,000.00 in license and mileage fees from the owners of motor vehicles. Over \$5,000,000.00 of this amount was contributed by automobiles and privately owned trucks not operating for hire. But a little over \$500,000.00 was contributed by all freight and passenger vehicles operating for compensation. Of this latter amount 2444 freight "contract haulers" paid but \$144,433.00 or \$59.00 per vehicle. This means that such freighters were free to operate day and night over the thousands of miles of state and county roads upon payment of but 15c per day in license fees per vehicle. Is it any wonder the automobile owner and small truck owners are crying out against the injustice of the prevailing fees?

The proposed Highway Protection Law (Freight Truck and Bus Bill) aims at securing lower license fees for automobiles and privately owned and operated trucks. It makes it the duty of the State Highway Commission to classify all traffic over our highways and determine the burdens imposed by each. Having this information before the Commission shall, in a report to the Governor, make recommendations for a redistribution of license fees. Such information when transmitted to the legislature will enable it to prepare a schedule of fees that will bring relief to the owners of privately operated vehicles and cause the heavy operators for compensation to contribute a just share of the cost of constructing and maintaining our public highways.
