RUSH FOR RECALL FAILS TO DEVELOP IN RURAL REGIONS Efforts to add impetus to the abortive and revengeful recall movement launched against Circuit Judge H. D. Norton have met with no success, according to reports received today from various parts of the county. There was no rush to sign the petitions, publicly announced as being on file in this city. Women circulators of the recall petitions were said to be making sympathetic appeals, alleging that they were the victims of "injustice," and that kin had "been railroaded." The petition circulators who have been concentrating their efforts in the rural districts have been meeting with rebuffs. It is said by residents of outlying areas. Opposition to the recall plot has developed in all sections of the county, and in most instances is decidedly emphatic. To date the fathers of the scheme have not seen fit to make their identity known, and the author of the petition title is equally silent. The petition title contains the phrases "bias and prejudice," "miscarriage of justice," and "endangering life and property," familiar terms in all parts of the county during the primary election storm. It is not anticipated that the circulation of the petitions will cease, until the time expires for filing same for the general election ballot, in November.
