

### SCHOOL MERGER PLAN VISIONARY DECLARES COLT

#### Member State Board Higher Education Declares That Scheme Will Lose Million Annuity to State of Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 30.—(AP)—An attack on the Zorn-MacPherson school consolidation bill by C. C. Colt, member of the state board of higher education, was made in a statement issued today by the "School Tax Saving Association," headed by Amadee M. Smith.

The statement quoted Colt as describing the Zorn-MacPherson bill as "an ill-considered, visionary scheme that will cause immediate loss of one million dollars in annual savings now secured under the board's unification plan" if the bill becomes law.

Colt told the Associated Press that the statement quoted him correctly. No act to grind. The statement quoted Colt further: "The board of higher education has no use to grind in this controversy. Neither has the federal survey which after exhaustive disinterested inquiry made a specific recommendation against physical consolidation of the university and state college. . . . by eliminating duplication of courses between different institutions and departments; salary readjustments; reductions in personnel, utilization of all physical plant facilities, etc., the board already has accomplished more than has ever before been accomplished in Oregon's history of higher education."

Huge Loss Seen. "But now, before the people of the state have had so much as an opportunity to study the worth of an orderly worked out method of actual economy, they are asked by secret unknowns to disregard all and plunge the state into a wild educational orgy. A concrete loss of \$1,000,000 a year in savings will be the first payment to the piper."

The statement concluded, still quoting Colt: "We do not know whom the actual authors of the Zorn-MacPherson bill are, but we believe in months of work and hard facts that the glib claims of its promoters are impossible of achievement."

### BOY SHOT IN HEART, SAVED BY SURGEON

VIENNA, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Rudolf Detschler, an 11-year-old boy whose heart was pierced by three birdshot in a hunting accident on Sunday, today was reported recovering after a remarkable surgical feat by Dr. Gustav Feilenreich of the University of Vienna.

The surgeon sewed up the three wounds in the still beating heart and later removed shot from the wounded lad's other organs. The entire operation was carried out with the utmost speed and a fatal hemorrhage forestalled.

### Historic Steamer Goes to Boneyard

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The steamship George Washington, on which President Woodrow Wilson made his historic voyage to Europe to participate in the Versailles treaty negotiations, started on her last voyage today. In the tow of seven tugs, the vessel headed down New York harbor en route to the graveyard of discarded ships in Chesapeake bay.

### WORK ON HIGHWAY FOR JOBLESS OF SOUTHERN OREGON

#### Siskiyou and Rogue River Projects Will Provide Jobs for Men of Locality is Chairman's Promise

PORTLAND, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Available funds, amounting to about \$3,000,000, will constitute the limitation to relief work of the state highway commission this fall and winter, Leslie M. Scott, chairman of the commission, said today. Money available will be equally divided between new construction and reconstruction of roads in the federal aid system of the state.

Scott's statement was made in answer to a letter from Raymond Wilcox, chairman of the state relief committee, asking for information relative to the program of the commission.

To Be Used Where Needed. Allocation of the available money will be made at points where there is the greatest need and the fund will not be pro-rated among the counties, Scott said.

To spread the work over counties instead of recognizing the construction needs would be an unjustifiable waste, the chairman believes. At the more important points the workers will be assembled by groups of counties, whose lists of unemployed are to be drawn from by contractors. "For example," said Scott, "for the Siskiyou and Rogue River jobs, men will be taken from the southern Oregon counties, including Douglas; for Modoc Point to Crater Lake park, from Klamath and Lake counties. 37 Projects Planned.

Scott said there are 37 projects on the program throughout the state. The chairman contended that the entire burden of relief work should not be placed on the highway department which, on the assumption that the number of unemployed listed this winter will reach 45,000, last season's figure, can provide labor for only 6 per cent.

Scott said revenue of the highway commission has been strained already to provide work, that funds are shrinking and that the commission is faced by a deficit of \$1,500,000 next winter. To meet this deficit the only means seems to be issuance of more bonds, the commissioner stated.

### GOLD HILL CONSIDERS HIRING SCHOOL NURSE

Dr. G. I. Drummond, county physician, and Mrs. Lewis Ulrich of the Jackson County Public Health association met with the Gold Hill school board last evening to discuss plans for hiring a school nurse for one day a week in the Gold Hill schools during the coming year.

The program was worked out satisfactorily and Mrs. Walker will carry on the work, the board having agreed to hire her for the position.
