DEDICATION RITES WILL BE FEATURE IN DAY'S PROGRAM

Judges to Attend. County judges from various sections of Oregon will be present to witness the dedication of the new building, including D. F. Thompson, Coos county; George A. Potter, Sherman county; D. O. Woodworth, Linn county; Fred R. Goddard, and the Klamath county commissioners; C. O. Gillette, Josephine county. Mayors of southern Oregon cities, including E. M. Wilson, Medford; George J. Fox, of Grants Pass; J. E. Thornton, Ashland; J. E. McClintock, Roseburg; O. M. Knox, Jacksonville; W. H. Ferguson, Gold Hill; W. D. Barnes, Phoenix, and James Whipple, Rogue River, will also be present.

Jackson county Granges will be officially represented by the various Grange masters of the district, including Albert Strauss, Fomona Grange master; Harry Weiland, Talent; George Andrews, Bellview; Ray Ward, Phoenix; H. The official unveiling of the marble plaque in the court house corridor will come at the end of Mr. Vining's dedication address, with the present county court, Judge C. B. Lamkin, Commissioner Victor Bursell and Commissioner John Barneburg officiating at the unveiling ceremony. Following this part of the services, George Codding, representing Medford Post of the American Legion, will present to the county the large American flag to be used on the building, and the flag-raising ceremony will be conducted under the direction of Company "A," 18th Infantry, Oregon National Guard, Captain C. Y. Tengwald commanding. The Elks' band will render the "Star Spangled Banner," and the program will be officially closed by the Ashland Scotch Kiltic band.

Seats Arranged. Invocation at the beginning of the services will be given by Rev. A. G. Bennett, and the benediction by Rev. W. H. Eaton, both of Medford. Seating accommodations are being arranged in front of the court house for the large crowd expected to attend the services, and in order that there may be no difficulty in hearing the various addresses, the new public address system of the Texas company has been secured, through the co-operation of E. C. (Jerry) Jerome, local agent for the company. This public address system is one of the finest on the coast, and reproduces both speeches and music without the slightest distortion. The entire area of the city park will be available for seating the crowd, and all will be able to see and hear everything that goes on.

HARTMAN ARRIVES FOR SUPERVISION PEAR EXPERIMENT

Dr. Henry Hartman, of the Oregon-Washington Pear Bureau arrived today to supervise the preparation of a number of cars of valley pears, for research purposes, on marketing, storage and transportation. Tests will also be made on various types of material used in packing, and different forms of packages.

Dr. Hartman will be here the entire month of September, and will then go to New York City and other eastern markets, for the purpose of observing marketing and storage conditions, and opening process. The edibility of the pear when it is in the hands of the ultimate consumer will also be studied.

The tests conducted by Dr. Hartman are a continuation of research work he has carried on for the past three years, and are largely financed by the Oregon-Washington Pear Bureau. They will dovetail with similar work carried on by the Department of Agriculture, and the Medford Experimental orchard, and with the pear advertising campaign.

Dr. Hartman will also make observations on the pin-hole rot, nest rot and other fungus like that afflict storage pears, and seek corrective
