

YOUNG COUPLE IN DESPERATE NEED AS STORK NEARS

Victim of a series of misfortunes that has left their little family penniless, a Central Point young woman is facing motherhood without funds, without bedding, without even the articles of baby attire usually prepared in homes for such an event.

Her young husband is desperate. He has been out of employment most of the time for many months and is hoping almost against hope that some miracle will happen whereby his wife will obtain the things she needs with which to face the ordeal whereby a new life will be ushered into the world. She is in exceedingly poor health.

The baby is expected about Tuesday, September 6. All efforts of the husband to find even odd jobs that he might have a little money and food in the house have been fruitless.

While the man and wife await the arrival of another member of their flock, their three-year-old daughter is going about in rags. She is shoeless. They have been unable to get clothing for her. The child knows that something unusual is about to happen for she has seen her mother weep at times and has noticed papa walking the floor.

This touching case of the need of a group of human beings for humanity came to the attention of Dr. Estelle Jones, pastor of the Four-square Gospel Lighthouse, two days ago. A ready Dr. Jones has given some help from the institution's meager resources, but funds, the right kind of clothing, bedding and baby clothes are lacking.

"I feel sure that many people in Medford and Jackson county would be glad to help this young couple bring a new life into the world," Dr. Jones said. "No doubt many persons have articles which would be useful at this time. The need for haste is imperative."

Dr. Jones added that any persons wishing to assist the young expectant mother could leave donations at the Lighthouse, 401 East Fifth street, at the Pacific Highway, day or night. She will be glad to deliver all donations and also will furnish further information to any citizens who care to visit the couple, she said.

ADAM EMIG RITES SET FOR SUNDAY

Adam Emig passed away at a local hospital Thursday at 3:00 p. m., after an illness of short duration. Mr. Emig was born in Germany, November 20, 1858, and at the age of 22, he left the old country, and came to the United States, landing at New York in 1880, during his eight years there he met and married Margaret Ziegler.

They left New York, coming west, and finally settled in Wenatchee valley of Washington, where Mr. Emig took up a homestead, living there for 10 years, and then coming to Medford, where they have made their home for 25 years. He had been farming most of that time.

He leaves a host of friends, who will be saddened to learn of his passing, and is survived by his wife, Margaret Emig, and three daughters: Mrs. John Brenner of Leavenworth, Wash.; Mrs. Joseph Wocknick of Portland, Oregon; Mrs. T. O. Ledinsky of Medford, 13 grandchildren and five great grandchildren, two brothers, John and Nick Emig of Leavenworth, Wash., and one nephew, Nick Kinchiff of Leavenworth, Wash.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Sacred Heart Catholic church, Saturday morning at 9:00 o'clock. Father F. W. Black officiating. Interment in the Skiyon Memorial park. Prayers will be held at the Perle Funeral Home this evening at 7:30.

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that disqualifies him as a matter of common decency from acting as a judge in the matter."

Roosevelt Silent.
"Nothing at all to say," was Gov. Roosevelt's only comment last night. But from Samuel Seabury, counsel for the Hoefstadter legislative investigation committee which dug up the material on which the unfitness charges were based, came this statement:

"The charges against the mayor were fully proved and corroborated in many instances by documentary evidence which was undisputed, and by the admissions of the mayor."

"The mayor's resignation in the face of this record is equivalent to a confession of guilt."

"No intelligent person will be misled by the mayor's attempt to substitute for a defense an assault upon the good faith and the motives of the legally constituted authority to review his acts while in office."

Significance Seen.
"It is highly significant that this excuse is availed of by the mayor on the eve of the governor's inquiry into the relations between the mayor and his fugitive agent, Sherwood."

Seabury has charged that Russell T. Sherwood, accountant, handled nearly a million dollars in transactions for the mayor before vanishing. Walker denies the charges.

The mayor, who has become pale and ill, spent part of his last day in office at the funeral of his brother, George F. Walker, in St. Patrick's cathedral. His frail shoulders shook and tears streamed down his cheeks. He was no longer the chipper, gay youth that New York and a large part of the world knew.

After the funeral he dropped from sight for hours, while rumors that he would resign flew. At 10 p. m. he returned to the Mayfair house where he lives, telling reporters he felt "great."

Statement Given.
"Get down to the city hall," he told reporters, with a laugh. "There's a statement waiting there for you."

Half an hour later, City Clerk Michael J. Cruise announced the mayor's resignation. Walker had submitted it after conference with political leaders reported to include John F. Curry, leader of Tammany hall, and John H. McCooney, Democratic leader in Brooklyn.

The mayor's chief counsel, John J. Curtin, who battled for him before Governor Roosevelt, had written him a formal letter in which he said there were two courses open to him:

1. "To continue to submit to the illegal and unfair proceedings before the governor, in which may eventually an illegal order of removal which would be void from its entry."

2. "To submit your case to the people of the city of New York, who, after all, are the ones most concerned."

Proceedings a Travesty.
Walker chose the latter course, declaring he was "submitting my case to the people who made me mayor, the people of the city of New York."

"Should I permit myself to be lynched to satisfy prejudice or political ambition?" he asked.
He called the proceedings at Albany "a travesty, a mock trial, a proceeding in comparison to which even the practice of a drumhead court-martial seemed liberal."

Walker, who became the city's chief executive in 1925, after a career as a song writer, lawyer, assemblyman and Democratic leader of the state senate, is the first mayor of New York to resign under charges.

McKee, who succeeded him, has been called the handsomest and most scholarly of all city officials. He is 43 years old, a lawyer and graduate of Fordham university with the degrees of A. B., A. M., LL.B. and LL.D. He has been an instructor in Greek, Latin and literature, a reporter, an assemblyman, and a city court justice. A resident of the Bronx, he is a friend of Secretary of State Edward J. Flynn, one of Governor Roosevelt's strongest supporters. He is married and has two children.



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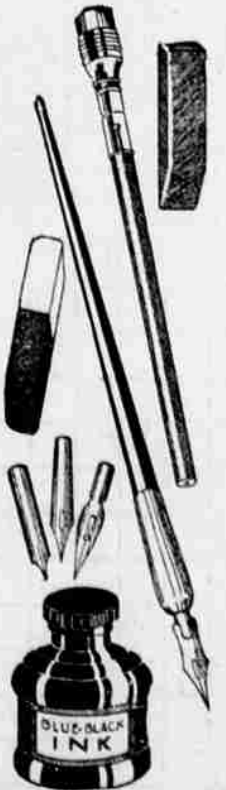
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
