

CROP 'DUMPING' TO BE EYED BY OREGON GRANGE

PORTLAND, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Ray W. Gill, master of the Oregon State Grange, today announced the personnel of the new state grange agricultural committee, and said this committee will meet soon to consider the action of large buyers and dealers who he said, are "dumping low-priced surplus crops from one community into other communities and breaking down the market."

The committee is composed of Fred Goff of Roseburg, chairman; Morton Tompkins of Dayton and George Fullenweaver of Carlton. "I am trying," Gill said, "to keep this committee fairly close together so it will be in close touch with the state department of agriculture, the Oregon State College and Portland market conditions."

Speaking of the "crop dumping" practice, Gill said "this practice is deplorable in normal times, but at a time like this when most of our major farm crops are selling below the cost of production, it is disastrous. I am asking the new agricultural committee to investigate this practice and it may become necessary to bring publicity to the operations of any firm engaged in this practice. Or it may be necessary to go further and pass legislation that will protect the farmer."

NEW YORK, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Stocks rallied smartly today, accompanying a rise of a cent a bushel in wheat and a maximum gain of \$2.50 a bale in cotton. On the stock exchange it was one of the broadest advances of the summer recovery and net gains of \$2 to \$6 were plentiful. Steel shares were prominent, reflecting reports that steel production would be stepped up substantially after Labor Day. However, the market was broad and all groups participated. FISHING REPORTED EXCELLENT, COAST

Excellent fishing still continues at Winchester Bay, both in sea trout and salmon, according to reports from the coast. The salmon take number 6's in both McMahon and Reeker waters.

Good catches have been made at alkenitch take this past week on bass, catfish and eastern perch, the bass being caught with perch scale, redhead and green bass plugs, and the latter two with worms.

At Loon lake moderate catches of bass, trout and catfish are reported. Use number 55 nickel Oregon for trout.

From Johnson Creek Falls up, in Smith river, excellent fly fishing now prevails. The best flies are Professor and Queen of the Waters.

Very splendid reports have come from the south end of Sillcoo lake on cutthroat trout, with the use of Doc Shelton spinner and worms.

BATEMAN SEEKING CRASH DAMAGES

Samuel Bateman, operator of gravel trucks, today filed suit in circuit court for \$480 alleged damages against the Rogue River Meat Co. and Allie N. Waddell and G. M. Coker. As the result of an auto accident on the north Pacific highway last May 18, Bateman seeks remuneration for the damages to his gravel truck and repairs thereon.

The complaint alleges that the accident was due to the "negligence and imprudent driving of Ruby Waddell, 19." It is charged that Miss Waddell failed to give due regard to the width, surface and traffic on and of the highway, and "failed to yield the right-of-way."

Coker, as driver of a Rogue River Meat Co. truck, is alleged to have driven from a parked position alongside the highway, into the traffic, and thus made the collision a three-cornered affair.

Attorney George M. Roberts appears as counsel for Bateman.

FOUR WILL FACE BURGLARY CHARGE

Luther Crosby, a convict on parole from state prison; Leslie (Buck) Wilson, former inmate of the same institution; Emalee (Bobby) Mansfield, alleged to have been often in trouble, and Vernon (Dodo) Burnett, all of Ashland, and charged with the robbery of the J. C. Penney store there last July, were scheduled to appear before Circuit Judge H. D. Norton this afternoon for plea.

Wilson, who claims he is a victim of circumstance and innocent of the charge, may postpone his appearance. Crosby was arrested Wednesday, upon his return from California, and is alleged to be the leader of the gang. The Mansfield woman is charged with receipt of stolen goods, and the rest with burglary.
