

SENATORS HOLD ONLY ANTIDOTE FOR YANK POISON

Games Today and Saturday Will Determine Season's Battle Between Teams—Count Now Stands at Tie

To the Washington Senators may fall the honor of being the only club in the circuit able to take the season's series from the New York Yankees, heirs-apparent to the American league throne.

The Yankees already have clinched the 22-game series with Cleveland, Detroit, St. Louis, Chicago and Boston and can get no worse than a tie with the Philadelphia Athletics. But with 20 games already in the records, they have gained no better than a draw with Washington at 10 victories apiece. Single games today and tomorrow will close the season's competition between the two clubs and give the Senators a chance to win the series.

Yanks Master A's.

The Yankees are almost certain of winning the series from the Athletics. They have won 11 of the 18 games so far played and need only one victory in the four games remaining to gain a decisive edge over the 1931 champions. Their record against the other clubs is, Cleveland, 13 victories and six defeats; Detroit, 14 and 3; St. Louis, 14 and 5; Chicago, 15 and 4; Boston, 14 and 4.

Washington won its tenth decision over the Yankees yesterday, 6-2, and came within two put-outs of becoming the first team to blank Joe McCarthy's sluggers this year. Alvin Crowder gave up only five hits until one was out in the ninth. Then he handed walks to Ben Chapman and Lyn Lary.

Ruffing Hits in Pinch.

A pinch single by Charley Ruffing sent one run over and a fielder's choice accounted for the other. The Senators meanwhile had hit Herb Pennock and Ed Wells at opportune moments, a triple by Joe Cronin and a home run by Gabe Bluege accounting for four of their runs in the third and seventh frames.

In the only other game played in the major leagues, the Athletics noosed out the Detroit Tigers, 5-4. Al Simmons and Bing Miller clouted home runs off Tom Briggs in the sixth frame, each time with a man on base, to provide the winning margin.

TALENT BLANKS SUTHERLIN, 8-0, AT FAIRGROUNDS

Talent took the measure of the Sutherland team in their game at the fairgrounds Thursday, with a score of 8 to 0. Cook pitched the shutout for Talent, and Konaster caught the full game.

Much credit is due the veteran Cook, and the outfield functioned perfectly. Marlow, new outfielder for Talent, showed up well, and is expected to be quite an asset in the Portland games Sunday and Monday.

No errors were chalked up for Talent, the only questionable play being a hot grounder to first base, but one on which the scorekeepers were compelled to give a hit instead of an error to first.

Sutherland ended up with two errors, three hits and no runs. Grants Pass defeated Sutherland, 3-3, in a previous game.

BYRNE LUCKY IN RECEIVING DRAW WITH NEGRO LAD

Jimmy Byrne of Marshfield was given a draw in a ten round bout with Bearcat Baker, of Seattle, colored flash, at the Armory last night after being outboxed and outfought for eight rounds. Byrne was lucky to break even with his younger foe.

The first five rounds lacked action, the negro popping Byrne with a left jab and the Coos Bay warrior coming to a clinch often. After the fifth the pace quickened, and in the ninth the fighters got down to heavy slugging with the black landing the heavier wallops.

In the final round the pair slugged it out, both feeling the effects of the heavy bombardment. The decision did not make the Cannonball or his manager happy.

Two or three times during the bout, held before a packed house, Baker showed flashes of his real speed. Herb White of Butte Falls scored a technical knockout over Young Farmer of Eugene. The upstate lad could not weather the heavy punching of White, and was knocked down twice before the towel was thrown into the ring. He was a clever boxer, but White apparently can "take 'em, as well as give 'em."

Arthur Hammond of Ashland, tried the Gene O'Grady trick of hitting Charles Norman of Medford over the referee's shoulder. They started again, and Norman socked Hammond so hard on the chin that he was knocked through the ropes and stayed on the floor, while ten was counted. Norman's quick and decisive victory pleased the crowd.

In the curtain Gene Mitchell of Medford was given a decision over Mickey Harper of Beagle, in the third round of a slugging match.

Jack Gibbs was introduced and offered to fight any light-heavyweight on the coast.
