

Fast Portland Team Plays Talent At Fairgrounds Today, Monday

THREE-PLY SERIES TO PROVE LOCALS HAVE TITLE CLAIM

Shapp's Outfit Will Meet Talent At 2:30 Today And In Double-Header Monday Starting At 1:30.

Talent's all-star team will open one of the hottest baseball series ever staged in southern Oregon when they meet the Portland Shapps today at 2:30 at the fairgrounds in the first game of a three-plate struggle, the second and third games of which will be played Monday, Labor day, also at the fairgrounds, starting at 1:30.

The Shapps rate second place in the Oregon State league after playing a tie series with the West Side Babes of Portland for the championship and losing the play-off. In view of the hectic competition which has taken place in the state league for the season's honors the type of baseball played by the Shapps should give Hoosier Hoffman's outfit a run for their money.

WALSH, DUTRA TO FIGHT IT OUT IN PRO GOLF FINALS

ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept. 3.—(AP)—Turning back a dramatic challenge by Tom Cravy in a stirring overtime struggle of 38 holes, Frank Walsh of Chicago today joined Olin Dutra, the par-busting tendorer from Santa Monica, Calif., in the finals of the national professional golf championship.

Cravy, fighting the battle of his golfing life to keep his crown, wrote a comeback saga for the northern galleryites over wind-tossed Keller. Eight down after the morning round, he stormed back in the afternoon to square the match on the thirty-sixth green and then tossed it away by miffing a five-foot putt on the second extra green.

Dutra fairly romped into the finals with a 3 and 2 triumph in a battle of the giants against Ed Dudley of Wilmington, Del., grabbing a four up margin in the morning with a brilliant 67—his fourth score in the sixteen during the tournament—and playing with fair comfort during the afternoon except for brief flurries by his rival as the wind played tricks with their pellets.

Walsh's struggle against the 22-year old Albany, N. Y., youth saw one of the most remarkable comebacks in golf, recalling the one that Bobby Cruickshank of New York won against Al Watrous of New York after 41 holes in the first round.
