These striking models were among the creations presented by 16 American designers, using only American-made materials, at an advance showing of fall fashions in New York City. The pleasing street frock at left is of maroon colored homespun crepe, trimmed on the sleeves and neckline in a burnt orange of same material. The afternoon costume at left of the center group displays the new drop shoulder treated with fur instead of cloth. In the center is an evening gown in a new self-printed satin with an interesting back design. A twisted roll outlines the low cut back, converging on a cluster of velvet flowers. The black wrap-around evening gown at right of the center group is of broadcloth, and shows the extreme décolletage typical of many of the new models. The two-piece sports dress at right attracted much attention at the New York display. It is done in rust-colored wool, with bands of gold and nailhead.

THREE-QUARTER PAYMENTS SOON ON AUTO PLATES

Official notice has been received by the sheriff's office from the secretary of state that on and after Wednesday, September 21, payments for auto license permits for the three-quarter period will be accepted. This is what a great many Jackson county motorists have been looking for, as it comes in time for them to go deer hunting, when it starts September 20. The three-quarter period issuance will also boost auto license permit sales which have been dribbling along at the rate of 20 per day for the past two weeks. The state police continue their drive to round up cars with Washington or California license plates, with the minimum of publicity. They have also rounded up a number of county residents for driving without any license at all. On this charge last week, H. C. Messinger of the Foots Creek district was hauled before Justice of the Peace H. D. Reed at Gold Hill, and given the alternative of buying a new license, or pay a \$5 fine or five days in jail. State police have also received a list of county residents, who within a fortnight have procured foreign licenses.

MOVE TO CLINCH REED CONVICTION

A motion, seeking affirmation of the conviction of Albert W. Reed of Denver, Colo., serving life in state prison at Salem, for complicity in the murder of Victor Knott, Ashland policeman, last November, will be filed with the state supreme court Thursday, District Attorney George A. Coddling said today. It was intended to file the motion Tuesday. It is a legal formality, and ends all hopes for the present, at least, of an appeal to the supreme court. Reed, nor his kin and friends were able to raise \$200 necessary for preparing the transcript of the testimony. Two recourses are open to Reed—gaining a re-opening of the appeal plea, and executive clemency. The latter is unlikely for many years, it is said.
