

COUNTY PRODUCTS TO BE DISPLAYED AT LEGION CONFAB

The supply of products from Jackson county, together with a quantity of descriptive literature and a group of attractive pictures of Southern Oregon attractions, which will be on display in the Hotel Benson, Portland, during the National American Legion convention, were taken to the Rose City today over the lines of the Consolidated truck lines, as that company's contribution to the display. Nearly 100 boxes of Medford pears, quantities of Ashland peaches, and a large supply of tomato juice from the Bagley cannery in Ashland made up the supply of products which will be distributed among the visitors to the Portland convention, as a part of Jackson county's efforts to advertise Oregon and assist in the entertainment of the many thousands of visiting guests.

The large colored photograph of Crater lake which hung in the lobby of the Jackson County Bank will be used as a background for the display, which is being prepared jointly by the Medford and Ashland Chambers of Commerce and the American Legion posts in the two cities. Other photographs of Lake o' the Woods, Diamond lake, Lithia Park, etc. will be used to illustrate to the many visitors the recreational attractions of southern Oregon.

Since the Hotel Benson is headquarters for the 40 or 50 fun branches of the Legion, the group which will view the Jackson county display will be representative of all parts of the country, and in charge of the feature are anticipating that a great deal of favorable publicity will be secured through the medium of this exhibit. Arrangements for the display have been made through the publicity committee of the local chamber, C. L. McDonald, chairman, and Dr. R. G. Barkwill, president of the Ashland chamber, and the secretary of the Medford chamber will supervise the setting-up of the display and the distribution of the products.

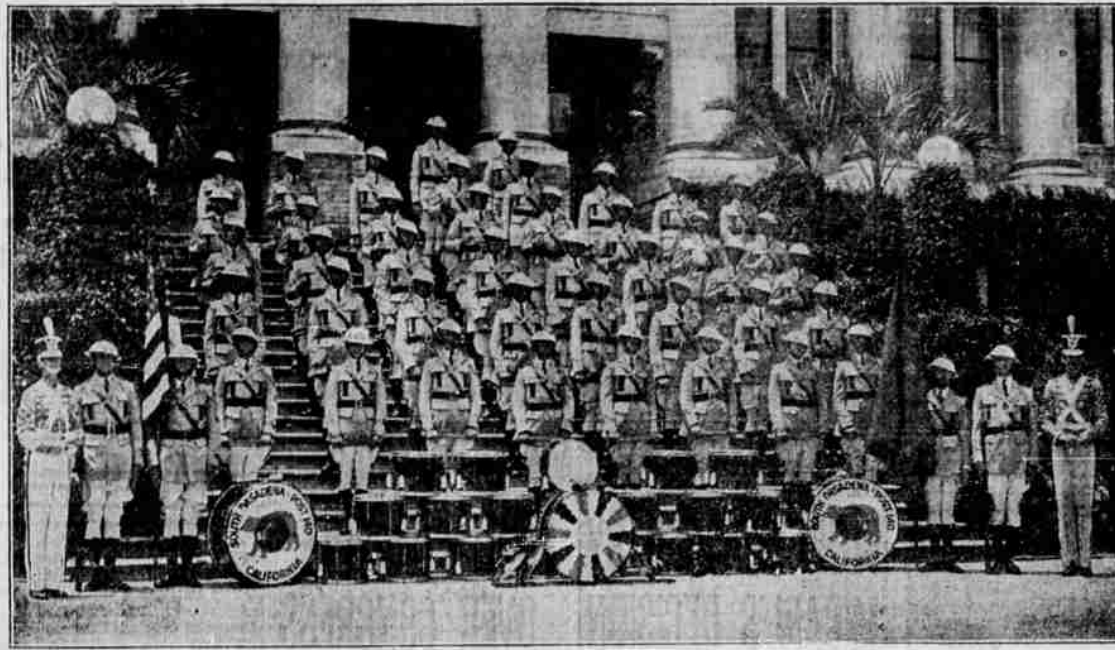

WEISER SUSPECT NOT P. McQUADE

State police this morning announced that a man giving the name of Albert Perry, held at Weiser, Idaho, as answering the description of Paul McQuade, indicted in this county for the murder of Victor Knott, Ashland policeman, last November, was not McQuade. McQuade with Lee Jackson, also indicted for the Knott slaying, are fugitives. Albert W. Reed is under life sentence in the state prison at Salem upon conviction of complicity in the crime. District Attorney Geo. A. Coddling appears before the state supreme court today seeking affirmation of the sentence as the time limit for filing an appeal expired a week ago. Reed, in testifying at his trial, branded the two fugitives as the slayers. Examples of the known handwriting of McQuade and the Weiser suspect were checked today by the state police and found to be different. The Idaho suspect answered in many details the description of McQuade. McQuade and Jackson, since the Knott murder, have at various times been reported in Arizona and Texas. Descriptions of the two men have been mailed to all sheriffs of the land.

Cows In Shade Produce Better Grade Of Milk. HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—A giant "umbrella" has been devised by J. E. Foster, veteran dairyman near here, to make his cows give richer milk. Foster said exhaustive tests showed cows sheltered from excessive sun heat gave milk with greater butter fat content. So he originated a big shed-like contrivance, mounted on four strong upright timbers, which is dragged about his pasture as the sun changes in position required, to furnish shade to his animals throughout the day. Foster first began to think about the matter when he noticed that cows milked at night gave 1 per cent less butter fat than those milked in the morning after hours free from the sun's rays.

Legionnaire Loses Luggage Enroute

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 8. (AP)—A man who offered him a ride to the American Legion national convention in Portland disappeared with his personal belongings valued at \$300. Leonard L. (Continued from Page One) his crossed" him in filing the duplicate stipulation.

The stipulation provides that the case be postponed until the October term of court, and that Bates, before February, 1933, move to Linn county and "from the Footh Creek district of Jackson county." It is further stipulated that Bates' departure is an important cog in the projected sale of his mine property.

The mine deal was supposed to be consummated September 1, with Dr. F. G. Swedenberg of Ashland, L. A. Banks, orchardist, and a mining engineer as the buyers. The price was announced as \$25,000. According to reports, \$1,000 was paid down September 1, \$800 of the amount being for taxes. The records of the tax department show that the mining property is listed to Jacob P. Lund and Margaret Lund, and that the 1931 taxes of \$13.35 had been paid.

The district attorney's office has no objection to the postponement of the Bates case, or the stipulation, it is declared. Last spring Bates, following two appearances in the Gold Hill justice court, through efforts of Attorney Frank DeSouza and women relatives, was released and went to Washington. He returned during the primary campaign. It was charged that he had been "banished" from the county, and his entanglements were cited as one of the "break-downs of law and order in Jackson county." The district attorney's office desires that the stipulation pending be a safeguard against a repetition of the above jummol.
