

THREE FLIERS DIE IN FLAMING PLANE FOLLOWING CRASH

Fourth Occupant of Ship Is
Saved by Safety Belt —
Plane Hits Side of Moun-
tain, Fire Follows Quickly

EL PASO, Tex., Sept. 8. — (AP) — Tightening of his safety belt saved George A. Davidson's life while his three companions on an airplane trip were burned to death when the ship struck the side of a mountain.

Pilot W. J. (Bryant) Robbins of the American Airways, his co-pilot, Francis W. Briggs, and Victor Kilman of St. Louis, a passenger, as was Davidson, were killed. The plane, wrecked yesterday morning, was found early today by two other American Airways pilots, Lt. McConaughy and Victor Miller.

Davidson, who lives in Richmond, Cal., was burned on his hands and face but suffered no serious injuries.

Found 3 miles from scene. The searchers found him about two miles from the plane. He had stopped to build a fire because he could not find his way well in the darkness and needed warmth against the chill air of the Guadalupe mountains, where the ship crashed. The mountain is about 75 miles east of El Paso.

He said he was nervous as Robbins tried to pilot the plane over the Guadalupe chain in foggy weather. As a precaution, he tightened his safety belt. When the plane hit the mountainside, the other three were thrown forward and probably stunned. Davidson's belt kept him in his seat and left him able to leap from the plane an instant before it took fire. Almost in a moment, the other men were burned to death before his eyes, as he stood helpless.

Stayed at Ranch. Davidson, refinery department manager for the Standard Oil company, remained at a ranch last night. The rescue party planned to visit the scene of the wreck today.

Kilman was en route to St. Louis from his mother's home in Los Angeles. Robbins was a cousin of Reg L. Robbins, who won fame in 1929 as an endurance flier. Reg Robbins taught his cousin to fly several years ago, and the two barnstormed together. Bryant Robbins had been a pilot for the American Airways since its inception as the Texas Air Transport. He leaves a widow and son.

YALE POSTPONES GRID LIMITATION

NEW HAVEN, Conn. — (AP) — Curtailment of Yale's football schedule to "five games, recommended last spring by a committee investigating the university's athletic program, is in no immediate prospect of adoption.

Schedules of eight games for 1933 and 1934 are nearly completed, and are expected to be announced in a few weeks. That will preclude a shorter season for two more years at least.

Elimination of three minor games was proposed by the committee as one of a score of recommendations to shift athletic emphasis from intercollegiate to intramural sports. Athletes and coaches alike attacked the suggestion.

To replace the contests, the committee urged the playing of a number of informal games between the Yale residential colleges, which will open next year.

ROOSEVELT STAND ON BONUS CLOUDY

NEW YORK, Sept. 8. — (AP) — Walter W. Waters, commander of the bonus expeditionary forces, wants Governor Roosevelt to clarify his position on the bonus question.

The Portland, Ore., leader of the veterans' advance on Washington, D. C., in a letter received by Roosevelt yesterday, requested that the Democratic nominee state his position. On a recent trip to the middlewest, Waters said, he found "extreme confusion existing in the minds of thousands of ex-service men" as to Roosevelt's views. Many of them, Waters added, are under the impression the nominee favors immediate cash payment. He added that "I feel that, in fairness to them, you should without delay clearly state your stand on this particular question."

BONUS ADVOCATES WILL HOLD REINS AT LEGION MEET

Convention Will Demand
Cash On Compensation
Certificates by Large Ma-
jority, Is Belief of Leaders

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8. — (AP) — Legion officials here predict advocates of immediate bonus payments will control more than four-fifths of the votes at the American Legion convention in Portland, Ore., next week.

Consequently, they expect the convention by an overwhelming majority will demand cash for compensation certificates. They fear, however, that the contest on the question might be prolonged by a dispute over whether the resolution to be adopted should mention the eviction of the bonus expeditionary force from Washington.

Tabulations kept by these Legion officials show that on the basis of the last convention's voting strength there will be 1180 ballots for the bonus and 61 against it, with the remainder as yet undecided.

The 1180 total covers 35 states and the District of Columbia departments of the Legion. Two other states—Virginia and Missouri—propose payment when it is believed the financial condition of the treasury can stand it.

Only three states so far have voted directly against payment. Those are Florida, South Carolina and Nebraska.

Seven department conventions, controlling 69 votes, took no action. These were Alabama, Delaware, Georgia, Maine, Vermont, Panama and Wyoming. Many members contend these will support payment.

Some Yet to Vote. Legion headquarters has not yet been advised of action by the departments of Alaska, Arkansas, Oregon, Canada, France, Hawaii, Italy, Mexico, the Philippine Islands and South Dakota.

With the majority committed to the bonus, officials think there is a possibility of an extended fight over resolutions similar to those adopted in Maryland, Massachusetts, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Texas, criticizing the manner in which the B. K. F. was evicted from the capital. These five states hold 248 votes on the 1931 convention basis.

New York, Illinois and New Mexico, where such resolutions were defeated, have 198 ballots. Backers and opponents of moves to criticize the eviction both predict success at Portland.
