# DEER SEASON OPENING SEPT. 20; LIMIT TOLD

The deer hunting season opens Tuesday, September 20, and according to Deputy Game warden Ed Walker, many hunters are under the mistaken impression that they are permitted to kill two mule deer. This is not the case. The law has not been changed. The limit for each hunter is one mule deer, as in previous years.

The state game law reads as follows, relative to deer:

**DEER WITH FORKED HORNS**—Open season September 20 to October 25 of each year. Bag limit: 2 Columbian blacktail deer or 1 mule deer or 1 white-tailed deer during any one season.
